

PARKS & RECREATION COMMISSION

REGULAR MEETING • MINUTES City Hall Council Chambers, 33 East Broadway Avenue, Meridian, Idaho Wednesday, June 8, 2022 • 5:30 p.m.

The Meridian Parks & Recreation Commission is a volunteer citizens' group that is created and empowered to advise the City on issues relating to park facilities and recreation programs of the City. Their mission is to gather input from staff and other qualified personnel on issues relating to the creation and design of public parks and open spaces; to listen to public input; and to provide advice and recommendations on parks and recreation related matters to the Mayor and City Council.

Commission President Jo Greer entertained a motion to approve the agenda as presented. Commissioner Dom Gelsomino moved to adopt the agenda. Commissioner John Nesmith seconded. All were in favor of the motion.

Commission President Jo Greer entertained a motion to adopt the minutes as presented. Commissioner Dom Gelsomino moved to approve the minutes. Commissioner John Nesmith seconded. All were in favor of the motion.

2. Upcoming Events - Shelly Houston

MPR Marketing Coordinator Shelly Houston provided an Upcoming Events flyer and highlighted the events noted, which is attached to these meeting minutes. She also handed out flyers about Sparklight Movie Night and Gene Kleiner Day (see attachments).

New Business

3. Ada County Parks & Waterways Update - Scott Koberg

Director Scott Koberg provided an Ada County Parks & Waterways Update via a PowerPoint, which his slides are attached to these meeting minutes. He also handed out copies of the Let's Float the Boise River! 2022 Guide pamphlets (see attachment).

Commission Feedback:

- Dom Gelsomino What is the status of cell service/coverage at Lucky Peak Lake these days? Scott will find the answer and email the MPR Department. [Note email received 6/14/22: There is a T-Mobile tower near the USFS Nursery but it does not have any other carriers on it. It does receive 911 calls and serves the lake in the near area. It's a private tower on private land so no idea why or why not Verizon isn't involved. There's no Verizon service out here other than what skips in from town near the dam, or in their Lake Office parking lot (they have a Verizon network extender on our fiber internet and Starlink that just serves the office area they had hoped for a more powerful network extender to better serve Sandy Point and the Power Plant but that didn't work out).]
- Mandi Roberts She asked Scott about the \$322,000 shuttle revenue figure in his PowerPoint. He explained this number includes equipment rentals and shuttles combined. How are those revenues spent? The way the County retains the contract revenue share becomes a portion of the Parks & Waterways fund balance initially. They then can integrate that fund balance into future budget requests for larger scale capital projects.

4. Arts & Culture Update - Cassandra Schiffler

5. May 11, 2022 Pathways Tour Debrief - Kim Warren

MPR Pathways Manager Kim Warren presented a PowerPoint to debrief about the May 11, 2022 Pathways Tour. Copies of her slides are attached to these meeting minutes. She solicited feedback from the Commissioners.

Commission Feedback:

- **President Jo Greer** She appreciated the tour and liked seeing other department representatives attend.
- Mandi Roberts Although she did not catch up with the group during the tour, she learned firsthand how these pathways provide safety to bicyclists and pedestrians alike. It was a great experience.
- **John Nesmith** He complimented Kim for doing a great job as tour guide. He stated it was fun to get out in an area of the city that is not only growing but new. He would like to see a pathway app developed for wayfinding purposes.

6. Meridian Pool Update - Garrett White

MPR Recreation Manager Garrett White presented a PowerPoint to provide an update about the Meridian Pool. Copies of his slides are attached to these meeting minutes.

• **President Jo Greer** – She inquired if the pool is heated. *Yes.* She also congratulated Garrett on becoming a Certified Pool Operator.

Staff Reports

7. MPR Staff

Director Steve Siddoway reported on the following:

- MPR Master Plan/Cost Recovery Model/Community Center An Open House was held regarding the Master Plan Update at Meridian City Hall on May 19, 2022, which went well. There were approximately 20 citizens who stopped by to look at the displays which showed the results from the surveys and inventory, and talked about the key issues matrix and some of the top issues that were identified that are going into the recommendations phase.
 - A **Cost Recovery** public sorting session was held at the end of April 2022. There is going to be an update to City Council next Tuesday, June 14th. Teresa Jackson will present the results of the public sorting session and show the pyramid. She will be back in town again in a couple of weeks for a series of staff workshops that will look at historic cost recovery rates compared to what the reconciled public pyramid suggests they should be.
 - On June 22, 2022, an Open House is scheduled about the new **Community Center** at City Hall in Conference Rooms A/B. There will be two separate times: 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and then 4 p.m. to 6 p.m.
- <u>Discovery Park, Phase 2</u> This phase of the park is well under construction. Lake Hazel Road is under construction; however, access to Discovery from Eagle Road is still open.
- Golf Course Irrigation Project This major construction project kicks off later this month.
- <u>Dairy Days</u> Kudos to Garrett White for participating in the Dairy Days planning.

Recreation Manager Garrett White reported on the following:

- <u>Priorities</u> He has been working on tasks related to the pool, master plan, cost recovery, and the new community center. He has been helping with Dairy Days.
- Sports There will be a Cornhole Tournament for Dairy Days on Friday, June 24th. Softball is underway; the end-of-season tournament is getting ready to start for the spring season. Fall Softball registration is currently open. Summer Volleyball is a 4 v 4 league that is happening at the Homecourt. They are also doing a Summer Basketball league (3 v 3) at the Homecourt. A Cornhole league is running.
- Arts & Culture Staff is working on traffic box wraps agreements, mural series, Five Mile Creek Pathway Trailhead project, and hiring a paid intern.
- Special Events Staff is working on Movie Night (this Friday is the first movie of the summer), Gene Kleiner Day, July 4th, etc.
- <u>Classes & Camps</u> Summer Camp kicks off next week.
- <u>Homecourt</u> The facility is still busy with Pickleball running. The YMCA summer basketball league starts next week. There will be a BSU basketball camp scheduled in

the near future. The same thing with a volleyball camp. There is a part-time Facility Specialist position vacancy they are looking to fill.

Pathways Project Manager Kim Warren reported on the following:

- <u>Pathway Infill Projects</u> Staff received back some solid, low bids on two Linder Road projects.
- <u>Creason Connection</u> The contractor is due to start by the end of the month—just north of 8th Street Park.
- Rail-With-Trail Pathway There was a recent development on this project, which is just west of Meridian City Hall. There is a segment from 3rd Street to 8th Street that has been federally funded, but the City did not have access out onto 3rd Street. So, staff had negotiated a potential land trade with the Head Start organization. After a few years, the board met again and agreed they were still in favor of this trade. City staff will meet with the people who administer the federal funds and also the Head Start people to get as much done in advance of the December date as possible so they can get the funds encumbered.
- <u>Locust Grove Pathway</u> She is still waiting on final approved plans. All easements have been received and recorded.
- <u>ULI Panel Visit</u> MPR staff members are working out logistics for the Urban Land Institute Panel Visit on August 8-11, 2022. Meridian will host and provide the project information and conduct site tours. There will be stakeholder interviews. A final presentation will be made by the panel on August 11th in the morning.

Adjourn

Commission President Jo Greer entertained a motion to adjourn the meeting. Commissioner Dom Gelsomino moved to adjourn. Commissioner John Nesmith seconded. The vote was unanimous and in favor of the motion.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at approximately 7:10 p.m.







- Develop new parks, facilities, and trails (assumes development and/or acquisition has already occurred)






















Is the river open?

Floater FAQs

The Boise River is never "closed" but is always a float-at-your-own-risk endeavor. Barber Park floater amenities, equipment rentals, and shuttle service are only available when river and weather conditions are appropriate (typically late June thru Labor Day).

If I bring my own raft or tube is there a place where I can fill it with air?

The Barber Park air stations are no longer operational. Feel free to "show up and blow up" as long as you BRING YOUR OWN EQUIPMENT to inflate your vessel. All floaters should also carry a hand pump during their float in the event of any unplanned deflation.

Do I have to wear a life vest?

Life vests or personal flotation devices (PFDs) are required to be worn by children age 14 and under. Every vessel must be equipped with a PFD for each person on board. Life vests are recommended to be worn by ALL floaters regardless of age or skill.

Are there any rapids?


There are three splashy diversion drops during the first half of the float. All floaters should use caution and actively steer their vessel to avoid all obstacles including bridge piers, rocks, debris, and overhanging tree limbs.


How far is it to the take-out?


The take-out is located 6 miles downstream from Barber Park on river left in Ann Morrison Park. The float typically lasts about 2 hours.
















Pool Information:
