MEETING • MINUTES City Hall Council Chambers, 33 East Broadway Avenue, Meridian, Idaho Wednesday, April 9, 2025 • 4:00 p.m.

The Meridian Parks & Recreation Commission is a volunteer citizens' group that is created and empowered to advise the City on issues relating to park facilities and recreation programs of the City. Their mission is to gather input from staff and other qualified personnel on issues relating to the creation and design of public parks and open spaces; to listen to public input; and to provide advice and recommendations on parks and recreation related matters to the Mayor and City Council.

ROLL-CALL ATTENDANCE

Commission Chair Dom Gelsomino asked for a motion to adopt the evening's agenda. Commissioner Alan Helms moved to adopt the agenda. Commissioner Terry Dennington seconded. All were in favor of the motion.

The floor was opened for questions.

1. Commissioner Terry Dennington asked who would be reading the proclamation for the Arbor Day event. Shelly responded that the Mayor would be reading it.

No further questions were raised from the Commissioners.

3. Volunteer Appreciation Presentation

Director Steve Siddoway presented cards and a gift to each Commissioner in appreciation of their time and service as members of the Parks and Recreation Commission.

4. Discovery Park Community Garden Update

Chris Verkerk, President of the Discovery Park Co-Operative Gardeners, presented a PowerPoint on the garden at Discovery Park. He provided a brief overview of the garden operations and volunteer support, including his own significant time commitment. He noted that the garden had gained some recognition following a feature on Channel 6 News.

Chris outlined current plans for the garden, including its location, size, and potential for growth. He shared the garden's motto: *"Planting a healthier tomorrow for our families and our community."* He elaborated on the benefits of the garden, its mission,

and long-term goals. The presentation included photos showing garden progress and volunteer involvement.

He highlighted several features of the garden:

- A seed library in collaboration with Zamzows (South Meridian location).
- Flower beds to encourage pollinators.
- A sensory section to support individuals with special needs.
- Partnerships with the North End Organic Nursery for tree fundraisers and donation efforts.
- End-of-season cleanup efforts to maintain a tidy space through winter.

Chris noted that over one ton of food was donated to the Meridian Food Bank last year. He concluded by showing a slide of sponsors and shared fun facts about the garden. Commissioners were invited to visit and participate.

The floor was opened for questions.

- Commissioner Bobo asked about the time commitment for volunteers. Chris explained that a flexible schedule is maintained to accommodate volunteers' needs.
- She also inquired about the size of the garden compared to Kleiner Park Garden. Chris stated they are similar in size, though Discovery Park's unique shape presents zoning challenges.
- Commissioner Helms complimented the garden's beauty and asked about volunteer demographics. Chris shared that only two volunteers live nearby, and unfortunately, there have been instances of crops being taken by individuals who have not contributed to the garden.
- Commissioner Bobo asked if the garden had signage. Chris confirmed that signage is in place, explaining the garden's purpose and requesting that people refrain from harvesting.
- Commissioner Dennington asked about educational aspects. Chris noted that volunteers receive hands-on learning in crop cultivation and that he answers questions from curious park visitors.
- Commissioner Dennington also asked about the selection of fruit trees. Chris said they defer to North End Organic Nursery for guidance on appropriate tree varieties for the area.

Director Steve Siddoway thanked Chris for his dedication and praised the garden's progress, calling it "remarkable and amazing." He asked how the City could direct potential volunteers. Chris shared that interested individuals can visit their website or Facebook page: *"Meridian Co-Op Gardeners – Discovery Park."*

No further questions were raised from the Commissioners.

5. Parks Maintenance Division Update

Parks Superintendent Mike Barton introduced Parks Maintenance Manager Jeremy Aldrich to the Commission.

Jeremy provided a brief overview of his background leading up to his current role as Parks Maintenance Manager. He gave an update on the current MPR maintenance staff, which includes 22 full-time employees (including an arborist), 12 seasonal positions, and 6 summer positions.

He expressed appreciation for the volunteer groups that have assisted with landscape maintenance and shared a list of various projects completed with their help.

Jeremy also presented images highlighting recent vandalism in public restrooms at parks, including graffiti and damage to sprinklers and irrigation pipes. He noted incidents involving e-bikes performing wheelies in and out of restrooms, which have caused damage to the epoxy flooring. The maintenance crew has learned to make small repairs to the epoxy as needed.

Additionally, he reported that concrete crack filling has been completed, which will help extend the lifespan of parking lots. He shared photos of several completed projects across different parks. Jeremy also noted a partnership with MYB (Meridian Youth Baseball) to upgrade the baseball fields and shared that plans are in place to update the bocce ball courts at Kleiner Park.

The floor was opened for questions.

- Commission Chair Dom Gelsomino asked about the cameras at Storey Bark Park above the outside of restrooms and if there was a consideration for the same above other restrooms that have been vandalized. Jeremy responded that there are cameras outside and above a majority of the buildings owned by the City and they have been instrumental in helping the police department with not only vandalism but also other issues that have occurred in the parking lots.
- Commission Chair Dom Gelsomino asked about the cost of crack filling in the parking lot compared to repaying the entire lot. Jeremy responded that the cost difference is substantial and emphasized that crack filling is not only a significantly more cost-effective option but also helps extend the overall lifespan of the parking lot.
- Commissioner Jennifer Bobo and Commissioner Alan Helms commented on the beauty of the parks and recognized the hard work of the staff to keep the parks and restrooms clean. They thanked Parks staff for their diligence with keeping on top of the graffiti. The Commissioners congratulated Jeremy on the new position as Park Maintenance Manager.

No further questions were raised from the Commissioners.

6. Fields District Future Park Update

Director Steve Siddoway provided a Fields District Future Park update for the commissioners. He provided a map describing the location in Northwest Meridian where there is an opportunity to purchase property for the future park and described the shape and key details of the property. Details were provided on the size and cost of the park. Next steps were listed that will be presented to the City Council for approval in the upcoming meeting.

The floor was opened for questions or concerns.

- Commissioner Jennifer Bobo asked about the size of the park. Director Steve Siddoway provided a size description in comparison to other current City parks.
- Commissioner Jennifer Bobo asked when development would begin. Director Steve Siddoway responded that the starting design is estimated at 5-10 years out depending on the subdivision development.
- Commissioner Alan Helms asked if the park will be connected to any of the future pathways. Director Steve Siddoway responded that there would be a connection to the Five Mile Creek pathway. Commissioner Helms asked who the builder is for the community. Director Siddoway responded that the Owyhee Holdings Group is the development entity.
- Commissioner Terry Dennington asked how the impact fees are being allocated within the budgets for the new park area and the new community center. Director Steve Siddoway explained that specific funds from impact fees have been set aside to ensure adequate funding is available for both projects.

No further questions were raised from the Commissioners.

7. MPR Staff

Director Steve Siddoway reported on the following:

1. Next Parks and Recreation Commission Meeting is set for May 14, 2025. The meeting location starts at Settlers Park for a behind the scenes tour.

Parks Superintendent Mike Barton reported on the following:

1. Ongoing work is continuing for the restrooms at Lakeview Golf Course.

- 2. Currently working on landscaping the 3 miles of medians along Ustick Road and finalizing agreements with ACHD (Ada County Highway District).
- 3. The Ninja course equipment is scheduled to arrive April 20th. Installation will begin at that time, along with the artificial grass and landscaping for the project.

The floor was opened for questions.

• Commissioner Alan Helms asked about the soundboards installed at Lakeview Golf Course near the restaurant. Parks Superintendent Mike Barton explained that the soundboards were added to help mitigate noise in the room. Commissioner Helms noted that the artwork on the soundboards also enhanced the room's appearance.

No further questions were raised from the Commissioners.

Recreation Superintendent Garrett White reported on the following:

- 1. Working on hiring for the summer for the Pool and Lakeview Golf Course.
- 2. Monica Salas has been hired as the new Administrative Assistant I at the Parks and Recreation front counter.
- 3. Working on the Idaho Parks and Recreation Association Conference.
- 4. Wrapping up the Meridian Youth Baseball agreement.
- 5. Continuing to work on the new Community Center.
- 6. Upcoming Events:
 - Unplug and Be Outside
 - Movie Night
 - Gene Kleiner Day
 - Summer classes and camps
 - Swimming lessons
 - Homecourt tournaments
 - Main Street Market

The floor was opened for questions. No further questions were raised from the Commissioners.

Pathways Project Manager Kim Warren reported on the following:

- 1. Kim recently met with a consultant and LHTAC (Local Highway Technical Assistance Council) to discuss the *Rail with Trail* pathway project.
- 2. The *Five-Mile Pathway* project is currently on hold due to an ownership dispute. A recent update to Ada County's ownership map shows that a portion of the pathway may cross private property. The City is working with its legal department and NMID (Nampa & Meridian Irrigation District) to resolve the issue and is prepared to move forward once it is settled.

3. A license agreement has been received to install a restroom facility at the Ten Mile Trail Hub.

The floor was opened for questions.

• Commissioner Jennifer Bobo asked about the pathway connection to the future Fields District Park. Kim Warren explained that a plan is in place to work with developers to incorporate pedestrian connections from the future Fields District Park to existing pathways.

No further questions were raised from the Commissioners.

Snapple Fun Facts

- Garden is .4 acres of land that was previously a sod farm.
- Water infrastructure was a city project as part of the phase 2 construction, estimated cost was \$8,000 not including labor.
- 50 yards of reuse, recycled, and repurposed wood chips were utilized for ground cover, pathways, and garden border.
- More than 50 yards of dairy compost was applied to the garden space to amend the soil.
- The garden has operated on a \$600 budget for this year that came from membership dues.
- One Ton of food was donated to local food banks in 2024
- 2000 lbs of Gypsum were applied this spring to help amend the clay soil.
- Currently have 12 members, LOOKING for more!
- Ada County Sheriff Alternative Sentencing has assisted with 2 full work days preparing the garden space for planting.
- There were at least 6 kill deer birds that were born this spring in the garden!

	Department Report: Acquisition of Approximately 40.82 Acres for a Future Community Park					

Recommended Council Action:

Approve the acquisition of 40.82+/- acres in northwest Meridian for a future community park.

Background:

Owyhee Holdings, LLC ("Owyhee Holdings") owns a significant amount of land in the "Fields Area" (i.e., the northwest portion of the City's area of impact). The City's Future Land Use Map identifies the need for a community park in this area. Owyhee Holdings is willing to sell 39.911+/- acres (the "Owyhee Holdings Property") to the City for this purpose at a reduced price of \$3,925,587 – well below the fair market value, which is approximately \$7,143,500. The difference between the fair market value and the acquisition price would be treated as a donation from Owyhee Holdings to the City. Additionally, Owyhee Holdings has negotiated a purchase and sale agreement with Intermountain Gas Company to acquire an additional 0.9+/- acres (the "Intermountain Gas Property") needed to develop the community park. The purchase price for the Intermountain Gas Property is \$168,684, which reflects fair market value, and Owyhee Holdings is willing to assign its interest in the purchase and sale agreement to the City. Thus, the City would acquire a total of 40.82+/- acres, as depicted on the attached location map, at a total cost of \$4,094,271 (plus closing costs and other related expenses). This acquisition is consistent with the Letter of Intent approved by City Council in January 2025. Park development impact fees will be used to fund the acquisition.

If the City Council wishes to proceed with the acquisition, it will be necessary to approve two related resolutions included on this same agenda, as well as a budget amendment. The resolutions approve the acquisition of the Owyhee Holdings Property and Intermountain Gas Property, respectively, and authorize the Mayor to execute the agreements and instruments listed on the following page.

A RESOLUTION APPROVING THAT CERTAIN REAL ESTATE PURCHASE AND SALE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF MERIDIAN AND OWYHEE HOLDINGS, LLC CONCERNING THE CITY'S ACQUISITION OF 39.911 ACRES FOR A FUTURE COMMUNITY PARK; APPROVING RELATED AGREEMENTS AND INSTRUMENTS; AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO EXECUTE THE REAL ESTATE PURCHASE AND SALE AGREEMENT AND RELATED AGREEMENTS AND INSTRUMENTS; AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO EXECUTE ALL OTHER DOCUMENTS; AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO EXECUTE ALL OTHER DOCUMENTS AND PERFORM ALL OTHER ACTS REASONABLY NECESSARY TO EFFECTUATE THE PURCHASE OF THE REAL PROPERTY; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Owyhee Holdings, LLC ("Owyhee Holdings") owns approximately 39.911 acres of real property southeast of N. Can Ada Road/W. McMillan Road ("Property"), as described in that certain Real Estate Purchase and Sale Agreement, which is attached hereto ("PSA"); and,

WHEREAS, the City desires to purchase the Property from Owyhee Holdings for a future community park and other recreational purposes, as authorized under Idaho Code section 50-301; and,

WHEREAS, the purchase of the Property will require the execution of the PSA and several related agreements and instruments, to wit: (1) South Collector Road Easement Agreement, which shall be substantially similar to Exhibit B to the PSA; (2) North Collector Road Easement Agreement, which shall be substantially similar to Exhibit C to the PSA; (3) Sewer and Temporary Access Easement, which shall be substantially similar to Exhibit D to the PSA; (4) Assignment and Assumption Agreement concerning the existing short-term farm lease encumbering the Property; (5) quitclaim deed to consolidate the Property with an additional 0.909+/- acres also being acquired for the future community park; and (6) other documents reasonably necessary to effectuate the purchase of the Property (collectively, "Related Agreements and Instruments"); and,

WHEREAS, the purchase price of the Property shall be \$3,925,587, which is approximately \$3.1 million less than the fair market value of the Property; and,

WHEREAS, the difference between the fair market value of the Property and the purchase price of the Property shall be treated as a donation from Owyhee Holdings to the City;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MERIDIAN, IDAHO:

Section 1. That the City Council hereby approves the PSA and the Related Agreements and Instruments, all of which shall be substantially similar to the attachments hereto;

A RESOLUTION APPROVING THAT CERTAIN REAL ESTATE PURCHASE AND SALE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF MERIDIAN AND INTERMOUNTAIN GAS COMPANY CONCERNING THE CITY'S ACQUISITION OF 0.909 ACRES FOR A FUTURE COMMUNITY PARK; APPROVING RELATED AGREEMENTS AND INSTRUMENTS; AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO EXECUTE THE REAL ESTATE PURCHASE AND SALE AGREEMENT AND RELATED AGREEMENTS AND INSTRUMENTS; AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO EXECUTE ALL OTHER DOCUMENTS; AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO EXECUTE ALL OTHER DOCUMENTS AND PERFORM ALL OTHER ACTS REASONABLY NECESSARY TO EFFECTUATE THE PURCHASE OF THE REAL PROPERTY; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Intermountain Gas Company ("Intermountain Gas") owns approximately 0.909 acres of real property southeast of N. Can Ada Road/W. McMillan Road ("Property"), as described in that certain Real Estate Purchase and Sale Agreement, which is attached hereto ("PSA"); and,

WHEREAS, the parties to the PSA are Owyhee Holdings, LLC ("Owyhee Holdings"), as the buyer, and Intermountain Gas, as the seller; and,

WHEREAS, Owyhee Holdings is willing to assign its rights and interest in the PSA to the City; and,

WHEREAS, the City desires to purchase the Property from Intermountain Gas for a future community park and other recreational purposes, as authorized under Idaho Code section 50-301; and,

WHEREAS, the purchase of the Property will require execution of the PSA and several related agreements and instruments, to wit: (1) Assignment and Assumption Agreement of PSA between Owyhee Holdings and the City; (2) Post-Closing Development Agreement between Intermountain Gas and the City, which shall be substantially similar to Exhibit C to the PSA; (3) quitclaim deed to consolidate the Property with an additional 39.911+/- acres also being acquired for the future community park; and (4) other documents reasonably necessary to effectuate the purchase of the Property (collectively, "Related Agreements and Instruments"); and,

WHEREAS, the purchase price of the Property shall be \$168,684, which is deemed to be fair market value;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MERIDIAN, IDAHO:

Section 1. That the City Council hereby approves the PSA and the Related Agreements and Instruments, all of which shall be substantially similar to the attachments hereto;
