City Manager's Weekly Highlights

Infrastructure & Community Investment

- **Advanced storm recovery and infrastructure improvements**, with San Bernardino County Flood Control crews actively working in Needles while City Public Works continued neighborhood cleanup, park maintenance, sidewalk repairs, and other communitywide improvements.
- **Continued investment in the City's gateways and public facilities**, with the approximately \$220,000 City Hall Awning Project completed, the new Welcome to Needles gateway sign entering its final stage, and Caltrans continuing improvements along I-40 and State highway facilities.

Economic Development & Legislative Affairs

- **Continued advocacy for AB 1756 and Opportunity Zone 2.0**, advancing two major initiatives supporting the City's long-term economic development, tourism, investment, and OHMV strategy, with the State's Opportunity Zone public comment period closing August 28.
- **Began evaluating newly issued Colorado River operating guidelines**, with staff reviewing potential implications for Needles' water entitlement, water supply, and future shortage conditions ahead of an update to the City Council.

Organizational & Community Progress

- **Strengthened financial transparency and organizational capacity**, publishing the complete FY 2026/27 Adopted Budget online and completing comprehensive HUD Capital Fund Program training involving Housing, Finance, and executive staff.
- **Continued targeted community safety and quality-of-life efforts**, including parking enforcement and business-access work along Front Street and coordination with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife regarding increased coyote activity.
- **Expanded community engagement**, launching the City's new online Community Events Calendar while recognizing City employees giving back to Needles youth through fall sports coaching.

1. **State of the City – October 7, 2026:** The City of Needles and the Needles Chamber of Commerce invite the community to the 2026 State of the City Address on Wednesday, October 7, 2026, at 6:00 PM at El Garces, 950 Front Street, Needles. Delivered by Mayor Janet Jernigan, this year's address will celebrate the City's accomplishments, provide updates on major projects and investments underway, and look ahead to the opportunities shaping Needles' future. Residents, business owners, community organizations, and regional partners are encouraged to attend and learn more about the progress being made throughout the community and the priorities ahead. Join us as we celebrate Progress • Momentum • Possibility and continue *Building Needles' Future Together*.
2. **Opportunity Zone 2.0 – Public Comment Deadline August 28:** The State's public comment period closes **August 28**. The City continues encouraging residents, businesses, property owners, and regional partners to support the designation of **Census Tract 06071010700** as an Opportunity Zone. **The City sincerely thanks those who have already submitted letters and comments in support of Needles' nomination.** This is the final week to provide public support before the State's deadline by [clicking here](#).
3. **Colorado River 2027–2028 Operating Guidelines Issued:** The U.S. Department of the Interior and Bureau of Reclamation have issued the [Record of Decision](#) for the Decision Framework for Colorado River operations for 2027–2036, along with [operating guidelines](#) for Lake Powell and Lake Mead for 2027 and 2028. City staff is reviewing the Record of Decision and operating guidelines to evaluate their specific implications for the City of Needles, including the City's Colorado River water entitlement, water supply, and potential future shortage conditions. City staff will present an update to the City Council at the next meeting outlining the new guidelines, what they mean for Needles, and any potential impacts or issues the City should continue to monitor. 4. **County Flood Control Crews Begin Storm Recovery Work:** Following the coordination efforts reported last week, San Bernardino County Flood Control crews are now on the ground in Needles actively completing storm-related cleanup and repairs. Heavy equipment was mobilized this week, with crews working within County flood-control facilities to remove accumulated material, restore drainage capacity, and address impacts from recent storm activity. The work represents the next phase of the City and County's coordinated response—from identifying needs to getting equipment and crews into the field. The City sincerely thanks San Bernardino County Public Works and the Flood Control District crews working in our community for their continued responsiveness, partnership, and investment in protecting Needles' infrastructure.

5. **Caltrans Improvements Continue Throughout Needles:** Caltrans continues to make visible improvements throughout the Needles area as work progresses along Interstate 40 and surrounding State highway facilities. In addition to the newly resurfaced sections of I-40, crews have been addressing streetlight repairs, trimming trees and vegetation, improving on- and off-ramp areas, and completing other roadside and maintenance work. The City appreciates Caltrans District 8 and its crews for their continued investment in our community and attention to the transportation corridors that serve Needles. These improvements not only enhance roadway conditions and safety but also improve the appearance of key gateways used every day by residents, businesses, visitors, and interstate travelers. **The City looks forward to continuing its partnership with Caltrans to identify and address additional opportunities for improvement throughout the Needles area.** Residents can also report maintenance concerns along I-40, US-95, or other portions of the State Highway System directly through the Caltrans [Customer Service Request portal](#).
6. **Public Works Advances Communitywide Improvements:** Public Works crews made progress on several community priorities this week, including sidewalk repairs along Bailey Avenue, cleanup in the Gates neighborhood, maintenance and cleanup at Train Park and Duke Watkins Park, and placement of dirt at El Monte. With major storm-response activities winding down, crews are increasingly focused on restoring public spaces, addressing neighborhood maintenance needs, and completing infrastructure and beautification improvements across the City. Staff will continue working through remaining storm-related items while advancing routine maintenance and other identified community priorities. 7. **Welcome to Needles Gateway Sign Moves Toward Completion:** Public Works crews completed preparation of the gateway sign structure this week along Historic Route 66, including painting and site preparation, and coordinated with the sign contractor for installation of the new **“Welcome to Needles – The Gateway to California”** sign. With the structure now prepared, the project is entering its final stage. Once installation is complete, the City will schedule a **ribbon-cutting and community sign reveal** to officially celebrate and showcase the new gateway entrance. Additional details will be announced in the near future.
8. **City Hall Awning Project Ribbon Cutting – Completion:** The City Hall Awning Project is now complete. The approximately \$220,000 project addressed deterioration at the City Hall Administration Building and included the installation of a new architectural awning and improved lighting. These improvements provide greater weather protection, improved visibility and safety, and help protect and maintain City Hall for continued public use. A ribbon-cutting ceremony will be held Thursday, September 3, at 9:00 a.m. at City Hall, 817 Third Street. The community is invited to join the Mayor and City Council as we mark the completion of this public facility improvement.

9. **FY 2026/27 Adopted Budget – Government Transparency:** As part of the City's continued commitment to transparency and public access to financial information, the FY 2026/27 Adopted Budget Book is now available on the City's website. The budget, approved by the City Council on June 23, 2026, provides the community with detailed information regarding City revenues, expenditures, capital investments, special funds, enterprise operations, and financial priorities. Making the complete adopted budget readily available online provides residents, businesses, and other stakeholders with direct access to how public resources are budgeted and invested in the community. 10. **Housing Authority Staff Complete HUD Capital Fund Training:** Executive Director **Patrick Martinez**, Housing Manager **Angelica Deerner**, Finance Director **Mark DeMay**, and Housing Specialist **Sierra Tieman** participated this week in a comprehensive **two-day HUD Capital Fund Program (CFP) training** focused on strengthening the Housing Authority's administration and oversight of federal capital funding. Training covered capital planning, eligible expenditures, procurement, HUD reporting and financial systems, Annual and Five-Year Action Plans, and critical obligation and expenditure requirements. The training supports continued efforts to strengthen staff capacity, cross-departmental coordination, compliance, and responsible management of Housing Authority resources.
11. **Code Enforcement Parking & Business Access Efforts:** Code Enforcement continued parking enforcement and education efforts throughout the community this week, with additional attention along Front Street consistent with the City Council's previous direction regarding parking conditions in the area. The effort is focused on improving parking turnover, maintaining access for nearby businesses and customers, and addressing long-standing parking concerns. Staff will continue monitoring conditions and working toward practical solutions that balance enforcement, public safety, and the parking needs of businesses in the area. 12. **Coyote Activity – CDFW Coordination and Public Outreach:** Following recent reports of increased coyote activity near the Needles Municipal Golf Course and surrounding neighborhoods, City staff coordinated with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) regarding appropriate response measures. CDFW recommends continued public education, reducing food attractants, supervising pets, utilizing appropriate non-lethal deterrence, and reporting concerning encounters. The City is re-sharing its **"Coyotes Live Here"** educational flyer and encouraging residents to report wildlife incidents through CDFW's Wildlife Incident Reporting System so activity can be documented and monitored. **Resources:** [CDFW – Coyote Safety & Coexistence](#) | [Urban Coyote Research – Management Strategies](#) | [CDFW Wildlife Incident Reporting System](#)
13. **Community Events Calendar Now Live:** The City's new website now features a [Community Events Calendar](#)—a centralized location for community events, public meetings, and civic programs. Local organizations are invited to submit

events or update existing listings through the City Clerk's Office to help keep the calendar current and inclusive. Residents can subscribe to and sync the calendar with their mobile devices for real-time updates, making it easier to stay informed about local events and civic activities.

14. **Needles Unified School District Fall Sports Kick Off:** Fall sports are underway at Needles Unified School District, with **Needles Mustangs Varsity Football opening its season this week against Parker**. The start of the season is also an opportunity to recognize City of Needles employees who give back to local youth through coaching, including **Tony Robalcab, Varsity Football Head Coach, and Jesse Fragoso, Middle School Football Head Coach**. Their involvement reflects the strong connection between City employees, our schools, and the community. The City wishes all Needles student-athletes, coaches, and families a safe and successful fall sports season. **Go Mustangs!**
15. **River Communities Coalition Rummage Sale – August 22:** The River Communities Coalition's Community Rummage Sale continues **tomorrow, Saturday, August 22, from 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at ABC Collision in Needles**. Proceeds support RCC community programs, and residents are encouraged to stop by and support this local community event.

City of Needles Invites Public to Support Opportunity Zone 2.0 Nomination

Residents, Businesses, Property Owners, and Community Organizations Encouraged to Submit Comments by August 28

NEEDLES, CA — The City of Needles is encouraging residents, business owners, property owners, developers, community organizations, and regional partners to participate in California's **Opportunity Zone 2.0** public comment process by submitting comments and letters of support for the City's nomination before the **August 28, 2026** deadline.

Although the City of Needles remains fully eligible for Opportunity Zone designation, the City's nominated census tract (**Census Tract 06071010700**) was not included on the State's initial list of recommended census tracts. The California Department of Finance is currently accepting public comments before California submits its final Opportunity Zone nominations to the U.S. Department of the Treasury.

The Opportunity Zone Program is a federal economic development initiative established to encourage the reinvestment of private capital into economically distressed communities through long-term investment. Opportunity Zone 2.0 expands opportunities to support housing, infrastructure, business development, manufacturing, transportation and logistics, tourism, workforce development, and other job-creating investments.

The Needles nomination represents one of only **four eligible rural census tracts in San Bernardino County** and builds upon more than **\$28 million in recent public infrastructure investments**. As California's eastern gateway, Needles is strategically located along Interstate 40, Historic Route 66, the BNSF Southern Transcon rail corridor, and Needles Municipal Airport. Combined with municipally owned electric, water, and wastewater utilities and development-ready sites, the community is well positioned to leverage Opportunity Zone designation to attract long-term private investment, expand housing opportunities, create quality jobs, strengthen regional supply chains, and support sustainable economic development.

On **July 28, 2026**, the Needles City Council unanimously adopted **Resolution No. 2026-33**, supporting and ratifying the City's Opportunity Zone 2.0 nomination. In adopting the resolution, the City Council found that continued Opportunity Zone designation will strengthen the City's ability to leverage public investment and enhanced rural Opportunity Zone incentives to attract private capital, expand housing opportunities, support business growth, create quality jobs, revitalize underutilized properties, diversify the local economy, and advance the City's long-term economic

development strategy. The Council also reaffirmed its commitment to fostering a predictable, investment-ready environment that supports sustainable economic growth, implementation of the California Jobs First Regional Plan, and continued revitalization of the City of Needles.

The public comment period provides an important opportunity for residents, businesses, property owners, developers, community organizations, and regional partners to demonstrate broad support for Needles' nomination. Every public comment and letter of support helps reinforce the community's commitment to attracting long-term investment and expanding economic opportunity in eastern San Bernardino County.

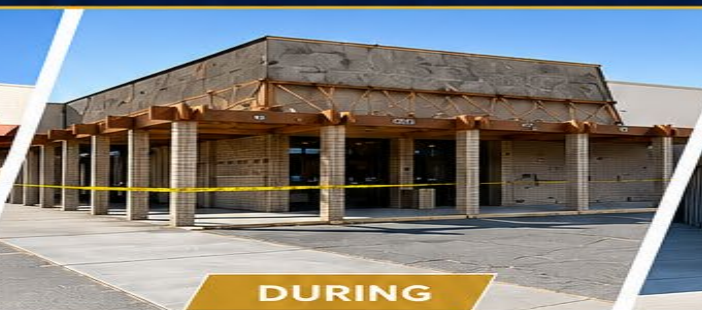

12. COYOTE ACTIVITY – COMMUNITY AWARENESS



BE COYOTE AWARE

Coyotes are common throughout North America, including in urban areas. You may see and hear them more during mating season (Dec-Feb) and when juveniles are dispersing from family groups (Sept-Nov). These facts and safety tips will help increase comfort and decrease conflicts when living or recreating near America's native "Song Dog".

FACTS

- Coyotes are members of the dog family; they are curious, adaptable, and learn quickly.
- Coyotes often mate for life, are devoted parents, and are highly communicative (barks, yips, howls).
- Coyotes weigh 18-35 pounds in the West and 30-60 pounds in the East.
- Coyotes may be more protective of dens/territories during pup rearing (April-Aug).
- Coyotes eat large numbers of rodents and rabbits, as well as fruit, vegetation, insects and carrion. They help keep ecosystems vital, healthy and clean.
- Coyotes are naturally wary of people but can habituate to our presence and the reliable food sources that we provide.

SAFETY

- **DON'T FEED COYOTES.** Their life and your safety depend on coyotes remaining wild and naturally wary of people.
- Remove attractants; pick up trash, secure garbage, and feed pets inside. Don't leave food or pets outside at night.
- Walk dogs on leashes, especially during pup rearing season (April-Aug). Pick up your small dog if you see a coyote and don't let pets roam.
- If approached, don't run. Wave arms, make noise and walk toward the coyote until he retreats. Be "Big, Bad and Loud."
- Avoid areas where coyotes may be denning or feeding/hiding pups.
- Appreciate coyotes from a distance. Share this information with family and friends.

COYOTES LIVE HERE



Coyotes are active year-round and become more visible during their breeding season in January through March. Pups are born from April to mid-May. Coyotes can be seen throughout the day, but are especially active at dawn and dusk. They may travel alone or in groups.

COYOTES ARE NATIVE WILDLIFE AND ARE FREE TO ROAM AS DETERMINED UNDER THE JURISDICTION OF THE DEPARTMENT OF FISH AND WILDLIFE: THEY ARE A NORMAL AND VALUABLE PART OF THE URBAN ECOSYSTEM. COYOTES KEEP RODENT POPULATIONS DOWN AND PROVIDE FREE CARRION REMOVAL, AMONG OTHER BENEFITS.

TIPS TO KEEP THE PEACE :

- **KEEP YOUR CATS INSIDE AND SUPERVISE SMALL DOGS OUTDOORS OR KEEP THEM IN PREDATOR-PROOF CATIOS OR DOG RUNS**
- **REMOVE ANY OUTDOOR PET FOOD**
- **REMOVE ANY BIRD FEEDERS OR REGULARLY CLEAN UP ANY FALLEN SEED AND SECURE IT TO ENSURE OTHER WILDLIFE IS UNABLE TO ACCESS IT**
- **PICK UP FRUIT AS SOON AS IT FALLS TO THE GROUND**
- **KEEP BARBECUE GRILLS CLEAN**
- **ELIMINATE ACCESS TO WATER ON YOUR PROPERTY, LIKE STANDING WATER OR BIRD BATHS**

Chamber staff administer the nomination process and provide procedural guidance to the judging panel but do not participate in deliberations, vote on finalists, or influence the outcome of the awards.

Final award selections are tabulated and verified by independent third-party observers to ensure the accuracy and integrity of the voting process.
