1. Making History: OHMV Master Plan Adopted

This past week, the City Council adopted Resolution 2025-38, approving the OHMV Master Plan and Routes - Pilot Project Technical Memorandum (July 21, 2025). The City of Needles is the only municipality among California's 482 cities authorized under AB 2152 (2022) to implement this program. The plan establishes 9.20 miles of combined-use routes connecting city streets with BLM trailheads, lodging, and service areas, while meeting state requirements on route length, speed limits, licensing, helmets, and insurance. The program is currently under review by the CHP Commissioner and is not yet in effect—offhighway vehicles cannot legally operate on city streets until approval is granted and the City completes implementation. An education and outreach campaign will accompany rollout, including signage, maps, FAQs, and community meetings, to ensure residents and visitors are fully informed and engaged. The pilot project is expected to expand recreational access, strengthen tourism. reduce private land trespass, and serve as a model for rural California. It also represents a major economic development opportunity, positioning the City of Needles as a premier hub for OHMV recreation and visitor spending. Refer to the attached map for reference.

2. Assemblymember Gonzalez Hosting Town Hall - October 3

Assemblymember Jeff Gonzalez will be hosting a Community Town Hall in Needles on Friday, October 3, 2025, from 6:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. at El Garces, 950 Front Street. This event is an opportunity for residents to engage directly with their State Assemblymember, share perspectives, and learn about legislative initiatives that impact our community. 3. NPUA Keeping Power Costs Low

This past week, the City Council approved a 2.7% cost-of-living adjustment to the basic service charge, effective October 1, 2025, along with a reduction in the

over-hydro rate from \$0.1423 to \$0.1159 and the elimination of the \$0.0300 Power Cost Adjustment. This outcome reflects outstanding work by the Utility Manager in keeping power costs low through proactive planning, competitive procurement, and strategic load forecasting. The result is a well-executed purchase strategy that balances increased demand with favorable pricing and fiscal responsibility—delivering direct benefits to Needles residents and businesses.

4. Honoring First Responders – LEARN THE BEAT Event

Western Arizona Regional Medical Center (WARMC) hosted the LEARN THE BEAT event at local schools, providing 75 eighth-grade students with hands-on CPR training. The event also recognized and honored First Responders—firefighters, law enforcement, and emergency medical crews—who place themselves in harm's way to protect lives and keep the community safe. Through this initiative, the local emergency medicine community is ensuring that every eighth grader from Laughlin to Needles has the opportunity to learn CPR. This effort spans public schools, charter schools, private schools, parochial schools, and homeschool programs, giving all students in the region the chance to gain lifesaving skills. 5. Utilities and Public Works Coming Together for Downtown Pride

As part of the City's downtown beautification efforts, Public Works and Utility crews have been preparing the heart of Needles for upcoming Route 66 Centennial activities and the Doors Open California Tour. Crews completed a full cleanup of the historic El Garces Harvey House grounds, while the Water Department painted 20 fire hydrants from Front Street to L Street, enhancing visibility and appearance along the downtown corridor. Military Moms banners were also installed by the Electric Department throughout downtown to honor local service members and add vibrancy to Route 66. In addition, sidewalk repair and replacement work improved pedestrian safety and accessibility in adjacent neighborhoods. These projects reflect a coordinated effort across departments to showcase Needles' historic landmarks, strengthen community pride, and create a welcoming environment for residents and visitors.

6. Medical Office Assistant Program

Staff partnered with First Institute Training & Management (FITM) to share information about the Medical Office Assistant Program, which is designed to prepare residents for employment in today's fast-paced healthcare environment. The program provides training in medical terminology, electronic health records, insurance billing and coding, HIPAA compliance, and patient coordination, while also developing administrative and communication skills. This initiative creates an accessible pathway for young adults and career-seekers in our community to enter the medical field without the need for lengthy higher-education programs. It directly supports the Council's goal to attract families and enhance supportive amenities by expanding healthcare career opportunities within the region. Staff will continue to promote this program to ensure maximum community participation and benefit.

7. San Bernardino County Workforce Development-Youth Forward

San Bernardino County Workforce Development recently launched the Youth Forward program, which connects eligible youth ages 16 to 24 with career training and support services. The program offers paid work experience, vocational training, individualized mentoring, career development, college enrollment assistance, and the opportunity to earn certifications in high-demand industries such as healthcare, IT, and technical trades. Youth Forward prioritizes services for participants who are low-income, homeless, foster or justice-involved, or facing basic-skills challenges. This program strengthens local workforce readiness and aligns with the City Council's family-friendly and economic development priorities by connecting young residents to career-sustaining employment opportunities and building a pipeline of trained workers to support employers in our region. Staff will continue to work with county partners to promote this program throughout the community.

8. Good Morning Needles - September Preview

The next *Good Morning Needles* coffee gathering is scheduled for next Thursday, September 18, 2025, at 7:30 a.m. at the Chamber and Visitor Center. The featured guest will be Sal Monica from the San Bernardino County Workforce Development Agency. Following the meeting, Mr. Monica will be available to meet directly with businesses employing five or more staff to discuss resources, training, and workforce solutions. These monthly gatherings continue to increase in attendance and provide a valuable forum for businesses, community members, and civic leaders to connect. Council is encouraged to share this opportunity with local employers who may benefit, and the Chamber will coordinate outreach to ensure participation.

9. Celebrating California's 175th Anniversary of Statehood

This week, the City of Needles joined communities across California in celebrating the 175th anniversary of statehood. During the City Council meeting, Mayor Jernigan read a proclamation in honor of this historic milestone. The proclamation recognized California's admission to the Union on September 9, 1850, and highlighted the State's enduring role in shaping the nation's economy, culture, and democratic values. The City Council emphasized the importance of reflecting on California's history while looking forward to its continued growth and resilience. As part of the broader *Celebrate California* initiative, the 175th anniversary highlights the Golden State's contributions in technology, agriculture, arts, entertainment, and innovation, while celebrating its diversity and resilience. The celebration also underscored the unique place of Needles in California's story—as the eastern gateway to the State and a community rich in heritage, shaped by the Colorado River, the railroad, and Route 66. By marking this anniversary, the City honored its contributions to California's past and reaffirmed its commitment to being part of the State's bright future.

10. Flag Football Final Sign-Ups

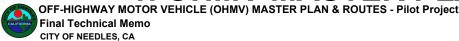

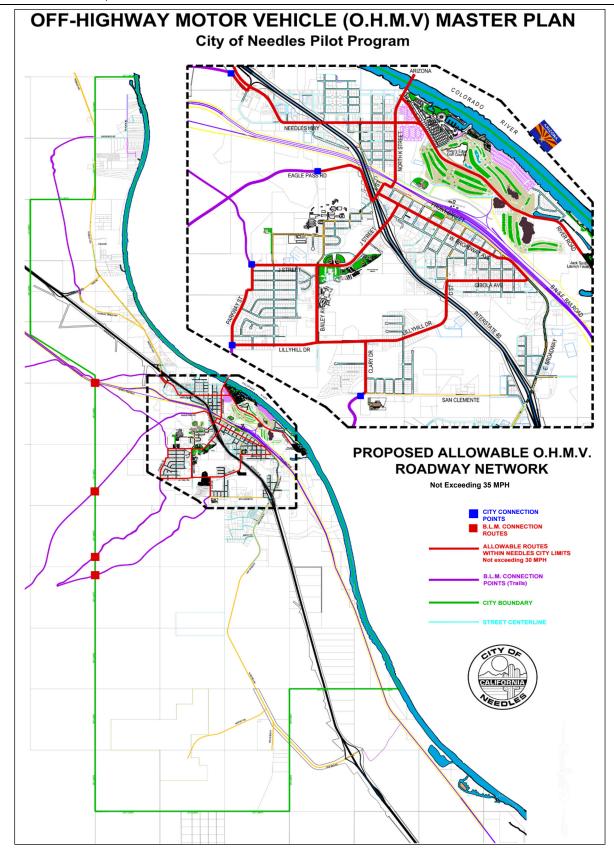


Figure 2: Proposed Allowable Off-Highway Motor Vehicle (OHMV) Routes Within the City of Needles & Connection to BLM Interface Point
