Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP)



- Designed to aid qualifying low-income households with a supplemental payment of a portion of residential heating costs for the winter heating season
- Encourages regular utility payments and promotes energy awareness reduction
- Eligible households may also receive financial assistance with a past due heat and/or electric account and repair or replacement of a nonworking heating system

Eligibilty is currently 200% of FPL

Low-Income Household Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP)



Provides assistance with past due water bills to avoid a disconnect from drinking water and wastewater

→ Households can receive assistance twice per year (10/1 - 9/30)

Eligibility guidelines are the same as LIHEAP

Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP)



- Helps to improve housing safety, comfort, and affordability to eligible households
- Services include a cost effectiveness energy audit, air leakage checks, insulation, and all combustion appliances inspection for repair and/or replacement
- All households who apply for LIHEAP are automatically placed on a waitlist for Weatherization services

Head Start & Early Head Start

- Head Start and Early Head Start promote school readiness of children and teach parents that they are their child's first and most important teacher
- Early Head Start | Home Visiting Services are offered in Allamakee, Clayton, Fayette, Howard and Winneshiek counties for pregnant women and families with children 0-3 years old
- Head Start | Child Development-Classrooms (Preschool programming) for 3–5-year-old children are located in all seven of the counties we serve





Both services are 100% free to eligible households!



Child & Adult Care Food Program (CACFP)



- The Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) is a federally funded program that is part of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA)
- Registered childcare providers in our seven-county service area are eligible for this program that:
 - Provides financial support for offering nutritious meals and snacks for children in childcare settings
 - Provides educational resources and training to expand the knowledge of good nutrition and childcare

Significantly decreases the financial burden of operating childcare



Allows registered childcare providers access to money that they would not have access to until tax time

Family Development & Self-Sufficiency (FaDSS)

- FaDSS engages families in dynamic partnerships to address their basic needs, improve child well-being, and develop career opportunities that, in turn, improves lives, families, and communities
- Family Development Specialists do this by:
 - Reducing sources of stress that destabilize families
 - Strengthening core skills that are essential for work, school, and life
 - Creating responsive relationships that are safe and supportive




