Strengthening San Juan County Communities through Prevention Healing and Hope Conference

Introduction & Purpose

The Bolder Way Forward San Juan Coalition supported by Utah State University's Utah Women & Leaders Project seeks to provide evidence based suicide and substance abuse prevention strategies, prevent and support sexual assault/violence survivors, while training and sharing resources that are tailored to San Juan County's unique cultural, geographic, and demographic needs. The project is aligned with the Strategic Prevention Framework (SPF) and directly supports countywide prevention goals.

San Juan County continues to face elevated risk factors in sexual assault, exposure to sexual violence, substance misuse and abuse associated with an increase in suicide ideation. Other risk factors tied in include geographic isolation, limited access to behavioral health resources, high rates of trauma exposure, and youth vulnerability that lead to substance misuse. Community partners and school personnel frequently report the need for additional tools, culturally responsive training, and public awareness strategies.

This conference provides an essential platform to reach educators, service providers, tribal community members, youth advocates, and local leaders. By uniting voices of faith and community leaders with clinical expertise, we will work to support the community in creating safe, trusting, and destigmatizing spaces that will begin community conversations, create upstream prevention while supporting survivors and their families.

Objectives

1. **Evidence-based Education** - Including QPR, Means Safety messaging, upstream prevention strategies, and trauma-informed approaches.
2. **Culturally Responsive Strategies** - Content is designed to the unique needs of Navajo, Utah, and rural communities within San Juan County.
3. **Multi-sector Engagement & Destigmatizing Conversations** – Presenters will collaborate with community leaders, schools, behavioral health providers, tribal programs, and youth coalitions with shared language, tools, confidence and compassion and evidence-based approaches that encourage and help survivors and their families.
4. **Promote Whole-Body Healing** – Highlighting and supporting mental, emotional, physical, and spiritual health as interconnected aspects of recovery and resilience for survivors and their families when reporting abuse.
5. **Bridge Building and Resource Sharing** – Strengthen families and partnerships between community organizations, health systems, faith leaders, community leaders and prevention coalitions for referral pathways, and prevention material.
6. **Practical Action Steps and Skill Building** – Provide leaders with actionable strategies for prevention, survivor support, and community resilience. Interactive components focused on recognizing warning signs, responding to crises, increasing protective factors, and reducing stigma..

Outcomes & Impact

- **Strengthen Local Capacity**
 - Early intervention, and crisis response in trauma-informed, healing-centered strategies presented to community leaders.
 - Youth 18 - 25 fall conference
 - Prevention coalition community workgroups working with local government to create and pass resolutions that gather support for stronger support and laws
 - Community support for school programs that assist with educating youth and families.
- **Increased cross-sector collaboration**
 - among tribal entities, faith leaders, community leaders, service providers, and prevention specialists
 - Ongoing data collection
- **Reduced stigma**
 - Increase community knowledge of suicide and sexual abuse warning signs and substance misuse with current prevention strategies
 - Increase protective factors for families and communities
- **Sustainable prevention and response capacity**
 - Promote protective factors, resilience, and connectedness across San Juan County to create conversations.

Closing

This presentation will build long-term local capacity by training community members who can continue to promote suicide, substance misuse and sexual assault/violence prevention strategies increasing support for existing support, and creating new supports and outreach coordination.
