CALL TO ORDER & ROLL CALL

DISCUSSION

- Community Liaison Update: There is a lot of planning and forecasting for the year happening right now and LTAC funding is coming soon.
- Chamber Update: Ribbon cutting for Beyond Laser and skincare and next week King Country filmworks and state filmworks are coming to the community to visit with councilmembers.

NEW BUSINESS

- CD Staff talked about the Economic Development Element of the Comprehensive Plan and showed a
 PSRC video on regional economic data trends. Jason Thibedeau from PSRC presented a guide to the
 Economic Development Element and gave some specifics to Snoqualmie.
- Jennifer Kirk from Reclaim presented on local homelessness services and data about how their model
 has been changing due to change in demographics. She discussed how lack of affordable housing is
 impacting homelessness and their current service level. They have a close relationship with SPD
 appreciate the behavioral health professional on staff.
- Police presented on local safety and low staffing continues to be issue (rely on overtime) but police
 maintains the 'no call too small' policy. There has been an increase in more need for use of force,
 police theorizes this is because of the increase in the amount of people struggling. They are trying to
 service those in need more.
- Staff presented on the 2023 work program for the Economic Development Commission. The work program is flexible based on concerns, but the major item is the Comprehensive Plan update.
