- 70 other

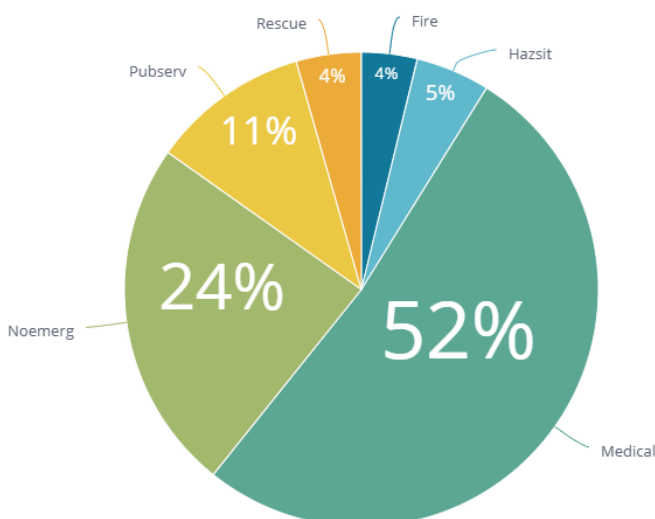
Mutual Aid

Travel Time

For incidents within the city in July, the 90th percentile travel time was 7:06

For incidents outside the city in July, the 90th percentile travel time was 18:36

EMS Transports

The Fire Department responded to 82 EMS incidents in July and transported 37 patients to local hospitals. Patients were transported to Swedish Issaquah 27% of the time and Snoqualmie Valley Hospital 62% of the time. Of the transports, 4 originated from outside Snoqualmie's service area (North Bend 4, Fall City 0).

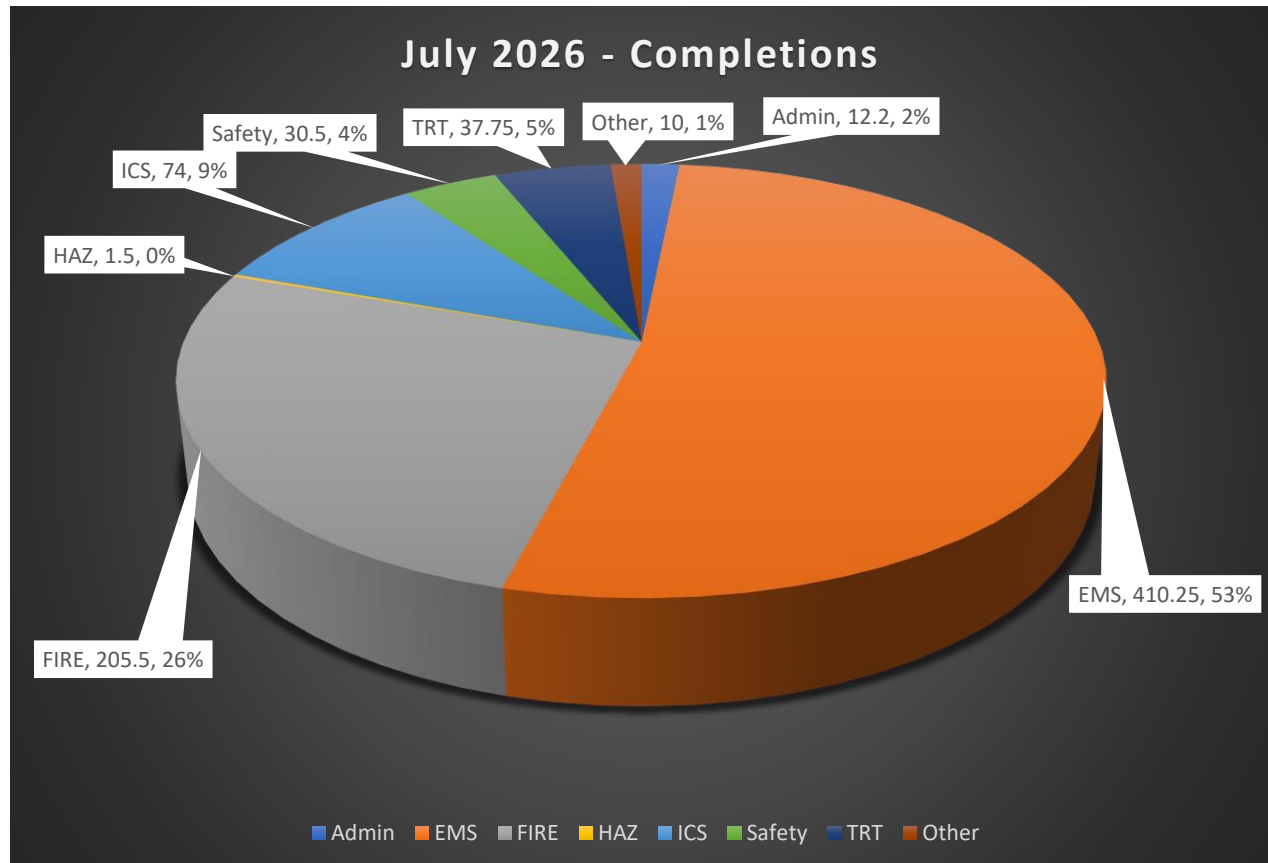
Volunteer Activity

During July, the following activity was recorded for the volunteer group:

- 39 Duty Shifts
- 88 Emergency Responses
- 557 Total hours spent volunteering
- 418.5 Total hours spent volunteering

Training:

July continues the department's emphasis on maintaining operational readiness during the peak summer response season. As wildfire potential and seasonal emergency activity remain elevated, crews focused on sustaining proficiency in core response disciplines while balancing daily operational demands. During July 2026, personnel completed over 781 hours of documented training, representing a 1% decrease from the 789 hours completed during the same period in 2025. Training remained heavily focused on emergency medical services, reflecting the department's primary service demand, while also reinforcing proficiency in fire suppression, incident command, technical rescue, and firefighter safety. For the month, emergency medical services accounted for 52% of all training hours, followed by fire suppression and rescue (26%), incident command (9%), technical rescue (5%), safety (4%), administration (2%), other training (1%), and hazardous materials (less than 1%).
