

RESOLUTION 1749

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF SNOQUALMIE, WASHINGTON, CALLING FOR A SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY ON NOVEMBER 3, 2026, FOR THE PURPOSE OF AUTHORIZING A TEN-YEAR, PERMANENT PROPERTY TAX LEVY LID LIFT STARTING IN 2027 TO MAINTAIN ESSENTIAL CITY SERVICES, HELP KEEP PACE WITH INFLATION, AND RESTORE CRITICAL ORGANIZATIONAL CAPACITY; SETTING FORTH THE BALLOT TITLE THEREFORE; AND REQUESTING THAT THE KING COUNTY ELECTIONS DIRECTOR PLACE THE PROPOSITION ON THE NOVEMBER 3, 2026, BALLOT.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Snoqualmie, Washington desires to provide for the continual provision of essential city services such as public safety, streets and park maintenance, and other governmental services; and

WHEREAS, in order to sustain the foregoing at levels which meet the Community's expectations, the city needs additional funds to supplement the existing general fund revenue which is applied for these purposes; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 84.55 RCW has limited the increase in property tax revenues to the City to a rate that has been less than the actual rate of inflation for the costs of providing services to the citizens of the City; and

WHEREAS, the City's current regular property tax levy, set in 2017, is \$1.61 per \$1,000 of assessed value, which is \$1.75 per \$1,000 of assessed value less than what is statutorily authorized; and

WHEREAS, since the City's property tax levy went into effect in 2017, the cumulative inflation in the Seattle area has increased by nearly 45% while the City's property tax collections have increased by 18% in that same period; and

WHEREAS, the increase in costs due to inflation has forced the City to implement additional revenue measures, reduce staffing, defer investments, and reduce city services in order to maintain a balanced budget; and

WHEREAS, the City's actions helped balance the budget for several years but also reduced the City's ability to plan ahead, analyze emerging issues, engage in regional issues, pursue improvements, prepare for future challenges, and influence decisions affecting the community, increasingly responding to those decisions rather than helping shape them for the betterment of the City and its constituents; and

WHEREAS, despite the City's efforts, the City will be required to substantially reduce essential services to the residents of the City or find alternative revenue sources; and

WHEREAS, without additional revenue, additional spending cuts will be needed. These spending cuts would likely include additional impacts to levels of service, including road and park maintenance; and

WHEREAS, without adjustment, future inflation will likely continue to outpace growth of revenues, increasing pressure for future service level reductions; and

WHEREAS, RCW 84.55.050(2) authorizes a city to place a ballot proposition before the voters to authorize a 10-year increase in the regular property tax levy; and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to prevent cuts in crucial city services or increase taxes or revenues by other means by allowing the electors to approve or reject a proposition under RCW 84.55.050(2); and

WHEREAS, RCW 84.55.050 provides for the levy of regular property taxes in an amount exceeding the limitations specified in Chapter 84.55 RCW if such an increased levy is authorized by a ballot proposition approved by a majority of the voters at an election held within the taxing district (a "levy lid lift"); and

WHEREAS, the proceeds of the increase in the regular property tax on real property that would be authorized by ballot proposition will provide funding for the continuation of essential City services; and

WHEREAS, the City Council also desires to exempt qualifying seniors, veterans, and persons with disabilities as permitted in Chapter 84.36 RCW; and

WHEREAS, the Council has therefore determined to submit a proposition to the voters authorizing a multi-year, permanent levy lid lift at an increased rate set by the proposition for collection in 2027, and at a rate not to exceed the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Customers (CPI-U) for the Seattle-Tacoma-Bellevue area or the Chapter 84.55 RCW limit, whichever is greater, for the ensuing years, at a special election to be held on November 3, 2026.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Snoqualmie:

Section 1. Call for Election on November 3, 2026. The King County Elections Director, as *ex officio* supervisor of elections in King County, is hereby requested to place upon the special election ballot in the City of Snoqualmie on November 3, 2026, a proposition for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the City, for their approval or rejection, a proposition approving a multi-year, permanent increase in the city's regular property tax levy exceeding the limit factor provided in RCW 84.55.050, for collection in 2027, in order to provide for the provision of public safety, streets and park maintenance, and other governmental services within the City. Said question shall be in substantially the form set forth in Section 2 below and shall authorize the City to levy a ten-year, permanent increase to the City's existing tax levy by \$0.60 per \$1,000 of assessed value, to a total regular property tax levy rate of \$2.16 per \$1,000 of assessed

valuation for collection beginning in 2027 and for the ensuing years set the limit factor at the greater of the CPI-U for Seattle-Tacoma-Bellevue or the statutory limit set forth in Chapter 84.55 RCW. The levy amount for 2037 shall be used to calculate subsequent levy limits.

Section 2. Ballot Title and Proposition. The ballot title and proposition to be submitted to the voters shall be in substantially the following form:

**CITY OF SNOQUALMIE PROPOSITION NO. 1
GENERAL CITY SERVICES LEVY**

This proposition would increase the City's regular property tax levy rate to \$2.16 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation for collection in 2027. The proposition would also authorize annual increases for each of the succeeding 10 years up to the June-to-June percentage change in the CPI-U for the Seattle-Tacoma-Bellevue area or the chapter 84.55 RCW limitation, whichever is greater. Existing RCW 84.36.381 exemptions would continue. Future levies would be calculated based on the 2037 levy limit.

Section 3. Changes. The mayor and city attorney are authorized to make such minor adjustments to the wording of such proposition as may be recommended by the King County Elections Director or to meet word count requirements, as long as the intent of the proposition remains clear and consistent with the intent of this resolution as approved by the City Council.

Section 4. Local Voters' Pamphlet. The city attorney is directed to prepare and submit the explanatory statement for the ballot proposition as required.

Section 5. Pro and Con Committees. The arguments for and against the ballot proposition shall be prepared by the committees appointed by the City Council pursuant to RCW 29A.32.280. The deadline for Council appointing the pro and con committees is August 4, 2026. If City Council does not appoint committees by the deadline, it is requested that the King County Elections Director establish the pro and con committees on a first-come, first-served basis pursuant to RCW 29A.32.280.
