- 79 other

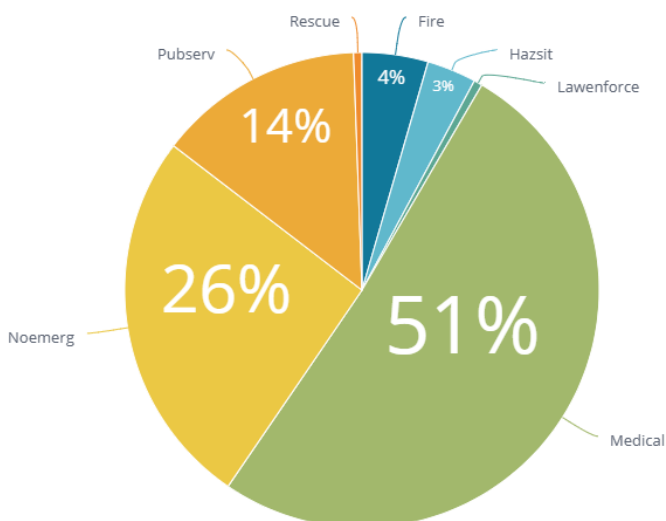
Mutual Aid

EMS Transports

The Fire Department responded to 91 EMS incidents in June and transported 24 patients to local hospitals. Patients were transported to Swedish Issaquah 33% of the time and Snoqualmie Valley Hospital 50% of the time. Of the transports, 2 originated from outside Snoqualmie's service area (North Bend 2, Fall City 0).

- Big Truck Day

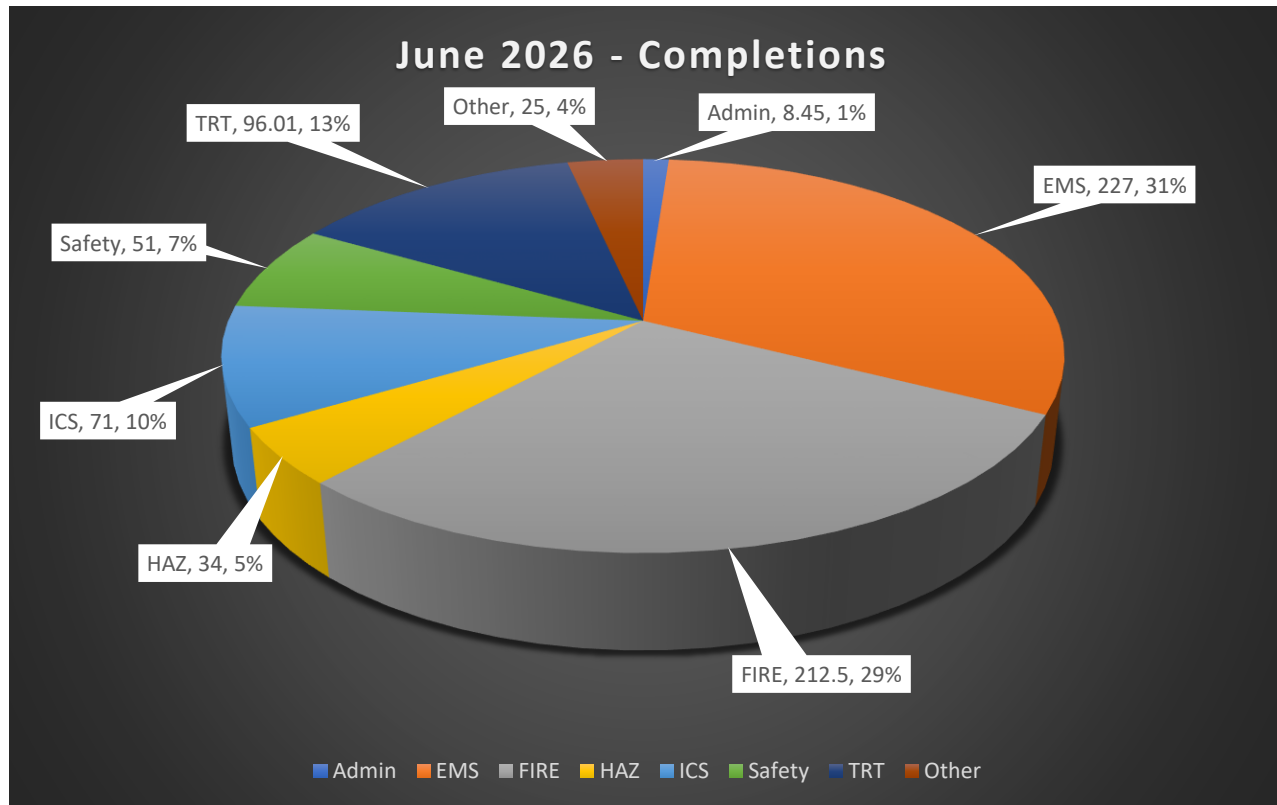
Volunteer Activity

During June, the following activity was recorded for the volunteer group:

- 25 Duty Shifts
- 32 Emergency Responses
- 418.5 Total hours spent volunteering

Training:

June sees more outdoor training in preparation for the summer months, when the weather shifts and the likelihood of fire events increases. As a result, we observe crews training more frequently, especially on high-risk objectives. In June, crews trained in wildland firefighting, pump operations, rope rescue, and incident command. While training hours increased 3% year over year, crews logged 725 hours of training throughout the month. Training for the month focused on emergency medical services (31%), fire suppression and rescue (29%), technical rescue training (13%), and incident command (10%).
