Trends:

Since April of 2020 we have tried to track some of the implications that COVID-19 may have had on a variety of calls for service. We have been trying to determine what effects the current pandemic situation has on them. The calls that we are monitoring include thefts, domestic violence calls, child abuse calls (physical and sexual), suicide calls, mental health calls and burglaries. Below is a comparison of those types of calls between the first quarter of 2020 and the first quarter of 2021.

Several of these calls raise significant concerns for our community. Those include the mental health calls, suicidal calls and child abuse calls for service. The calls that are listed under the mental health calls can be subjective in nature. These are the calls where the officer that is responding believes that the mental health of the person associated with the call has played a significant part in the PD having to respond. Not all of these calls result in any type of law enforcement action being taken. In order to attempt to address the increase in these calls, CSO Morgan and I have been in contact with Linn County Mental Health. Our intent is to work with Linn County Mental Health on a regular basis (ideally weekly) and attempt some additional outreach and follow-up with certain individuals that we are having repeated contacts with.

Our increased engagement with Linn County Mental Health may also help us address the increase in calls involving individuals believed to be suicidal. The same type of follow-up may benefit those individuals as well.

May is designated as Mental Health Awareness Month which is appropriate and timely for our increased calls for service associated with it. Throughout May, our hope will be to raise awareness about Mental Health and ensure that individual know that they are not alone.

The final concern regarding the pandemic's potential impact seen in our calls for service are associated with reports of child abuse. The concern is that our calls of this nature have increased 43% between the first quarter of 2021 compared to the first quarter of 2020. Not all of these cases are substantiated for any type of abuse, whether that is physical or sexual. Many involve concerns for the welfare or safety of a child and do not equate to abuse. Some encouragement can be taken from this increase. That is the simple fact that citizens are continuing to call and report potential concerns for children. Many other inferences can be made as to why the calls have increased but it is difficult to identify the exact problem.

Staffing remains an issue for our Department. We are currently in the process of filling two open police officer positions. We have several background investigations going on and are still actively recruiting other potential applicants. These positions are in addition to one other that has been filled, but the officer is still in our field training program. In essence, we are down three patrol officers.

The good news is that Officer Ean Mason has completed the DPSST Police Academy and is back at the Department training with a field training coach. Upon his graduation, Officer Mason received the Outstanding Health & Fitness Award for his Basic Police Class BP405. This award is presented to the individual who excels in the area of physical fitness. We are very proud of Ean and look forward to his continued success in his public safety career.
