When you hear a fire alarm, stop what you are doing and get low to the floor. Stay where you are until you are told to evacuate.

If you see a fire, call 911 and tell the fire department where the fire is.

Fire is a dangerous force that can spread quickly. It can cause serious injury and property damage. To stay safe, you need to know how to respond in an emergency.

1. Stop, Drop, and Roll: If your clothes catch fire, stop, drop to the ground, and roll over and over until the fire is out.

2. Get Low and Go: If you see a fire, get low to the floor and crawl to the nearest exit. Remember, smoke rises, so the air is clearer near the floor.

3. Don't Use the Elevator: In a fire, the elevator can become a trap. Always use the stairs.

4. Stay Calm: In an emergency, staying calm is crucial. Follow the instructions of the fire department and evacuate the building quickly and safely.

5. Practice Fire Drills: Regular fire drills help you become familiar with the evacuation routes and procedures in your building. This can save lives in a real emergency.

6. Know Your Exit: Know the primary and secondary exit routes from your building. Make sure you know how to use fire extinguishers and fire blankets.

7. Check for Smoke: If you feel a fire alarm, check for smoke. If you see smoke, get low to the floor and crawl to the nearest exit.

8. Don't Re-enter: Once you have evacuated the building, do not re-enter until you are told it is safe to do so.

9. Help Others: If you see someone who is having trouble evacuating, help them. Assist them to the nearest exit.
