## **2023** Report for the City of Tualatin





#### The Pandemic is now in our rear-view mirror.

- Both daytime and evening (Ice Age) programs are now in person.
- Heritage Evening was restored last year with great success.
- Rentals have picked up. Though we did lose our largest renter, Weight Watchers, many others have followed to keep us on track.
- The Heritage Center typically has ~400-500 visitors per month including those from home school programs.



- A new "heritage" plant graces our garden—a very rare tree peony gifted to us from John Chamberlain. John was the guardian of this Sasaki family plant whose provenance goes back over 100 years.
- Oral Histories continue to be recorded. With the assistance of local videographer Mike Loftin, we added about 2 per quarter to our archives this year.
- More and more art events are finding a home at the Heritage Center. That
  includes our home grown "Fabric of our Lives" quilt show.
- We provide space for the monthly "Tualatin Together" meeting.
- And, after a 3-year hiatus, our History Day for 4<sup>th</sup> graders was back.





The scholarship began in 2010, an idea of Tualatin Historical Society past president Jack Broome.

Jack realized the historical society needs new and younger people to carry on in future generations. He insisted we must do our part in perpetuating the interest and belief of young people's involvement in history. THS started its first scholarship of \$2000 - which since has grown to \$3000 - for a qualified graduating senior from Tualatin High School. The committee had been headed by Norm Parker and now Chris Tunstall leads this important group.
