





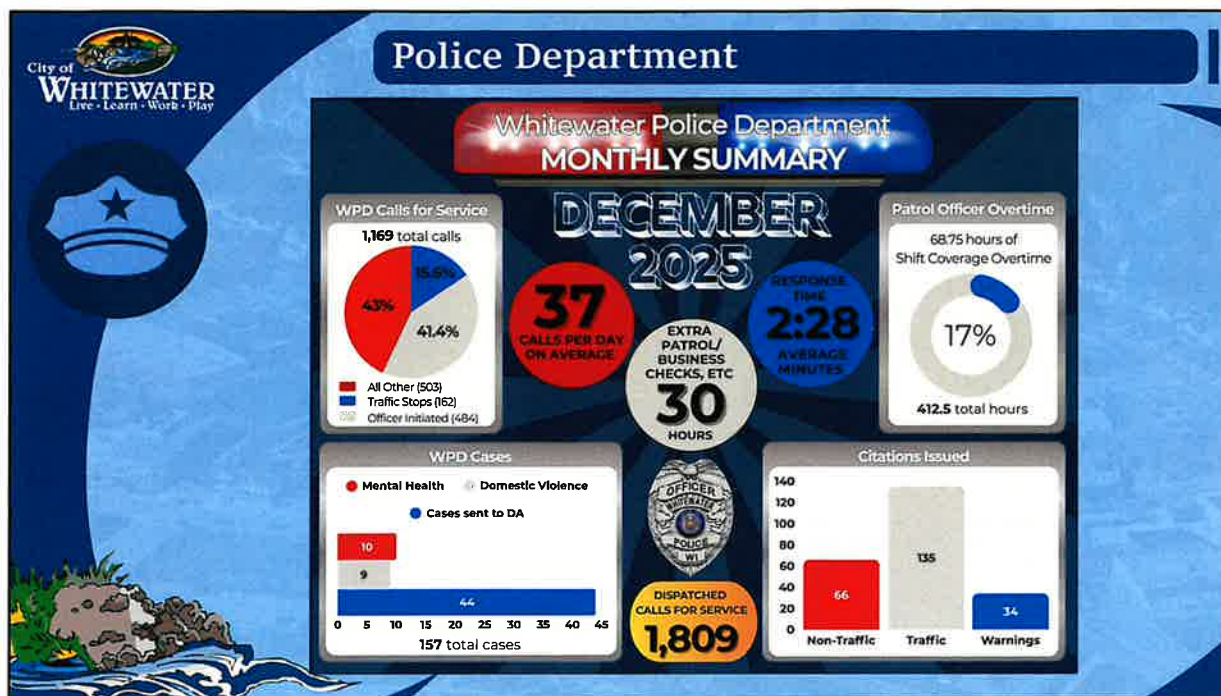
Highlight: For the Week of

In the Street Department crews were busy filling potholes with cold mix. The rain, freeze, thaw cycle is not good for existing potholes. Additional work included traffic signal and street sign repairs; collecting Christmas trees; cleaning, servicing and repairing equipment; removing Christmas decorations; street sweeping and cleaning inlets.

In the Wastewater Department staff submitted the annual Phosphorus report for 2025; installed a new drive chain on the secondary clarifier; completed root cutting in sewers with known root issues; and working on putting together a sewer repair list focusing on interceptors lines which many have not been cleaned or televised before.

In the Water Department staff fixed a service leak at their facility and repaired a water main break on Fraternity Lane just south of Florence Street. The majority of the work at Well 7 is completed except for inside painting and installation of a valve that still needs to arrive. Staff is also working on the PSC report for 2025 and updating the Risk and Resiliency Plan which is due by June of this year. Staff is also working on finding acceptable homes to perform the required lead and copper

testing later this year.



Highlights:

- The Police and Fire Commission met and formally approved Olivia Monson (Mon-sun) for promotion to detective. Detective Monson came to our agency earlier this year with nearly five years of law enforcement experience. In her time as an officer, Olivia's roles as an evidence technician and sensitive crimes team member, as well as her training in forensically downloading electronic devices have prepared her for this transition to our Detective Bureau. Olivia is also a fluent Spanish speaker, which is an incredible asset to our department and the community. Please join us in congratulating Detective Monson!
- Shane Houk (HOKE- like oak), Jacob Golembiewski (GO- LEM-VIEW SKEE) and Adam Moore were formally sworn in as police officers. They will begin the law enforcement academy in early January at Waukesha County Technical College. After approximately four months, they'll return to us and begin field training .
- Community Service Officer Jacob Ihm (like Him without the H) began employment with WPD. Jacob is currently a student at UW-Whitewater studying Criminology.

- **PD staff attended the Crossing Guard/Bus Driver appreciation breakfast at Whitewater High School. Thanks to those individuals who work daily to keep our students safe.**
- **Sabrina Ojibway (OH- HIB- WAY) began Police Staff and Command training through Northwestern University. This is a very challenging course and represents the gold standard of administrative training in law enforcement. Sabrina will complete a total of 10 weeks of coursework asynchronously over the next 22 weeks.**
- **Special Agents from the Wisconsin Department of Revenue trained our staff in tobacco licensing and inspections. Upon completion of the training, our staff assisted in conducting inspections on local businesses.**
- **Sworn staff began annual Defensive Tactics training provided by our in-house instructors. All sworn will complete training within the next two weeks.**

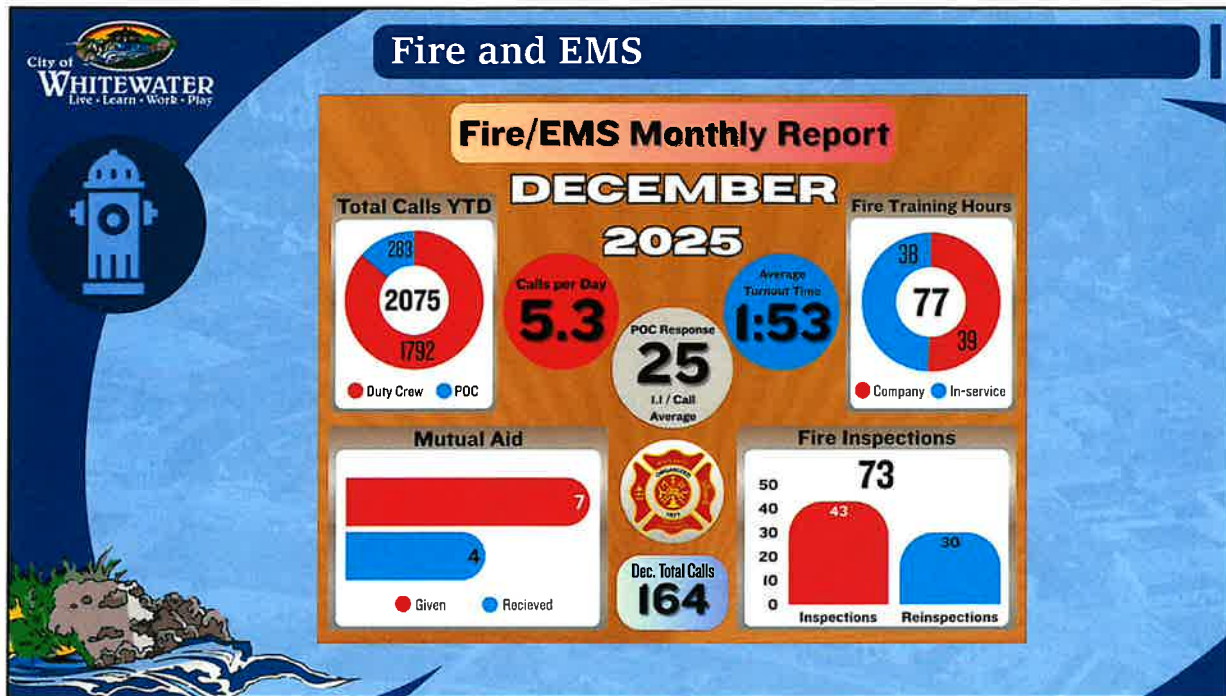
Monday, December 15th = Staff held a call with the communications supervisor at the La Crosse County Communications Center to learn about their use of artificial intelligence in call taking.

WPD is looking for our next Patrol Officer Applications will be accepted through February 5th.

Wednesday, January 14th = PD and IT staff met virtually with Angus-Young staff to continue to firm up plans for the PD Evidence/Training garage. We expect to have a finalized design in February.

Thursday, January 15th = PD supervisory staff held our bi-monthly staff meeting. These meetings provide the opportunity to discuss challenges or concerns and ensures we have a common understanding of any operational changes.



Highlights:

- Week of December 4th -10th-
- Staff responded to 37 calls for service, making the daily average of 5.28 calls for service each day.
- 4 calls for service required POC response. Average POC response for All Calls was 1.0 per call.
- Mutual Aid was requested once from Whitewater during this time, and we did not request Mutual Aid.
- Week of December 11th -17th-
- Staff responded to 45 calls for service, making the daily average of 6.4 calls for service each day.
- 8 calls for service required POC response. Average POC response for All Calls was 1.25 per call.
- Mutual Aid was requested twice from Whitewater during this time, and we requested Mutual Aid once.
- Week of December 18th -24th –
- Staff responded to 32 calls for service, making the daily average of 4.5 calls for

- service each day.
- 5 calls for service required POC response. Average POC response for All Calls was 0.8 per call.
 - Mutual Aid was requested twice from Whitewater during this time, and we did not request Mutual Aid.
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- Week of December 25th-31st.
 - Staff responded to 34 calls for service, making the daily average of 4.8 calls for service each day.
 - 5 calls for service required POC response. Average POC response for All Calls was 0.4 per call.
 - Mutual Aid was requested once from Whitewater during this time, and we requested Mutual Aid once.
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- FF/Paramedic Ashley Dodd's last day. We wish Ashley all the best as she begins her new position with Madison Fire Department.
 - Whitewater was requested with an Engine and a Chief for Change of Quarters by Elkhorn for a working structure fire. Units were cancelled before going enroute.
 - Whitewater was requested with a Tower Ladder and a Chief by Elkhorn for a working structure fire. A pass was taken for the Chief, and the Tower Ladder was cancelled enroute.
 - Whitewater responded to a fatal MVA. (press release attached)
 - LaGrange was requested with an Engine and Chief as Auto Aid for a possible structure fire. Command cancelled Lagrange prior to arriving on scene after confirming the incident was able to be kept to a single Engine response.
 - Whitewater was requested to Milton with an Engine and a Chief for a working structure fire. Lakeside FD pulled MABAS Box 30-4-2 to the box alarm. Whitewater responded with an Engine and pass was taken for the Chief.
 - Whitewater was requested to Fort with an Engine and a Chief for a Natural Gas leak. MABAS Box 81-21 was pulled to the Alarm level. Whitewater responded with an Engine and a pass was taken for the Chief.
 - Fire/EMS responded to Lake Geneve for a change of quarters with an Ambulance for a MABAS call for a working structure fire. Ambulance 123 responded to 1 call for service while providing station coverage.
 - Fire/EMS responded to a single-family residence in the town of Richmond for the report of smoke inside the home. Crews found embers smoldering in the subfloor and in the wall near a service door. Auto Aid was provided by Darien with a Tender and Lagrange with an Engine and Chief
 - Monday, January 12th started the final week of the recruit academy for the new hires.
 - Tuesday, January 13th Whitewater was requested with an Engine for mutual aid by Lakeside for a forklift on fire inside of a commercial building. The Engine

request was cancelled by Lakeside prior to Engine 122 going enroute.

Whitewater was requested by Fort Atkinson for an Engine on MABAS Box 81-21 for a structure fire. Engine 122 was cancelled while enroute.

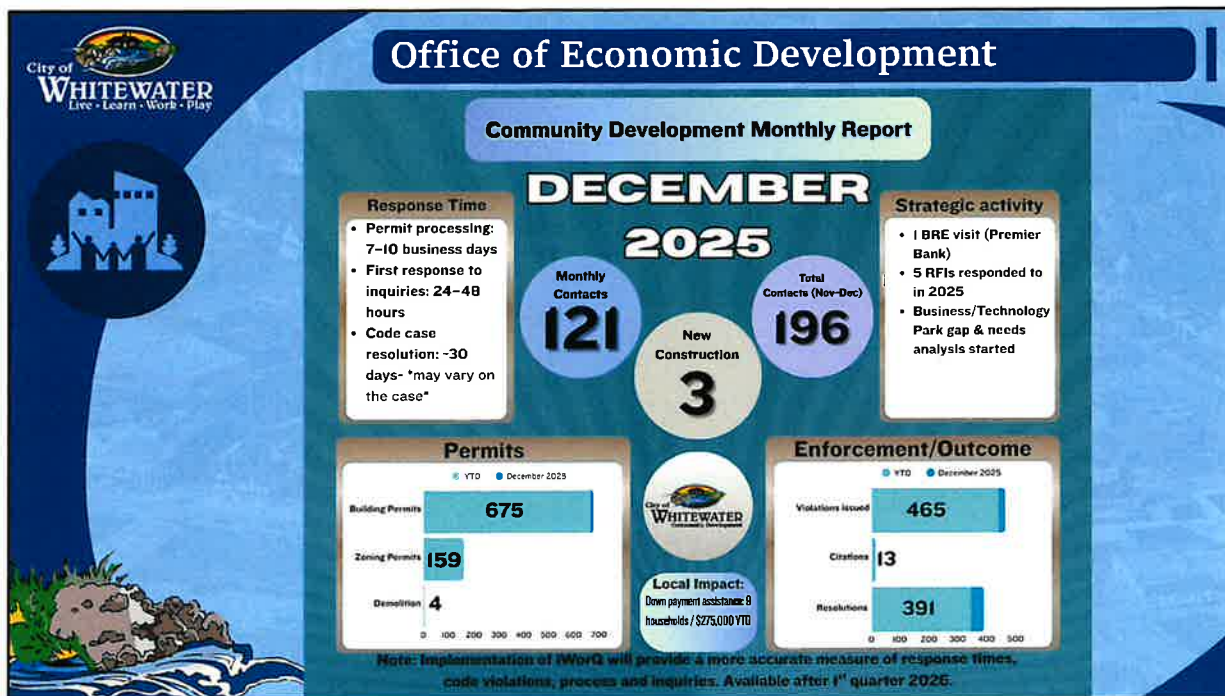
4 candidates interviewed with the Police and Fire Commission. conditional offers of employment were sent on Thursday, December 18th .

Staff attended the monthly EMS training conducted by Mercy Hospital. This month's training was skills check off.

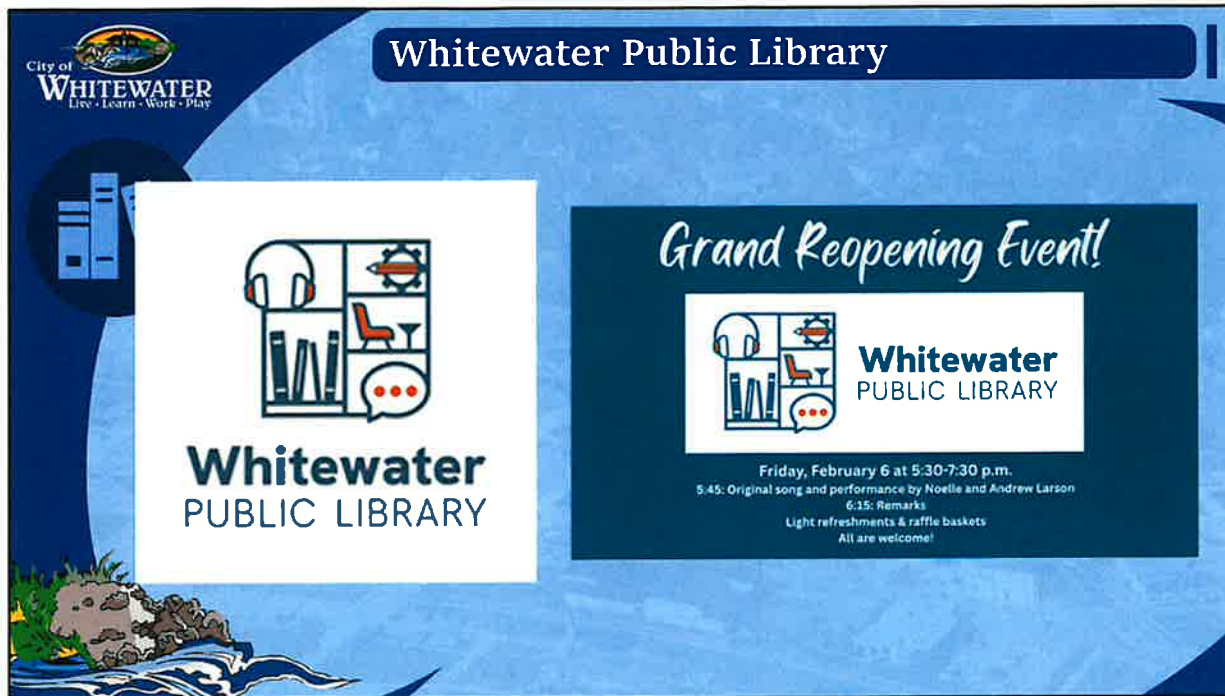
AC Dion attended the ELL group meeting at the High School and the Richmond Townhall meeting.

Highlights:

- **HEXPOL(HEX- POL) BRE Visit:** City staff and the Whitewater Area Chamber of Commerce met with HEXPOL leadership at the Whitewater facility to discuss operations, workforce needs, and future plans. HEXPOL employs approximately 40 people locally and reaffirmed its commitment to being a preferred employer in the community.
- **Comprehensive Plan Update:** RDG will be in Whitewater the week of February 9 to present to the Plan & Architectural Review Commission and conduct community listening sessions. The Comprehensive Plan update will continue through 2026.
- **Jefferson Street Project:** City staff are working with Redevelopment Resources to evaluate redevelopment options for three CDA-owned parcels at Jefferson and East Main Streets, with the goal of returning the property to the tax rolls. A recommendation will be presented to the CDA at a future meeting.

- Our library patrons saved \$1,379,746.50 collectively by using our public library in 2025.
- We are busy planning our Grand Reopening Event which will take place on Friday, February 6th from 5:30-7:30 p.m. Everyone is invited to attend! FYI: February is Library Lovers Month!
- We had great attendance at the library programs we held the first week of January in our new space. The Girl Scouts used Meeting Room One for their meeting on Thursday, January 8th and had nothing but wonderful things to say about the accommodation. Here is an excerpt from the thank you email we received from the Sarah Hoots, Troop Leader: "I just wanted to gush for a moment about how amazing Girl Scouts went tonight! We loved the new space...the tables are so easy to move around, it really is such an easy space to setup and teardown. I'm excited to refer other community groups to checkout the space."

addition to the library is the seating area located outside of the Whitewater Room, which houses local materials pertaining to Whitewater and authored by Whitewater residents.
