**PROCLAMATIONS**

We have two Proclamations tonight.

The **First Is National Public Works Week**. I will read the Proclamation:

WHEREAS, public works professionals focus on infrastructure, facilities, and services that are of vital importance to

sustainable and resilient communities and to public health, high quality of life, and well-being of the people of the City of

Wilsonville; and,

WHEREAS, these infrastructure, facilities, and services could not be provided without the dedicated efforts of public works –

professionals, who are engineers, managers, and employees at all levels of government and the private sector, who are

responsible for rebuilding, improving, and protecting our nation’s transportation, water supply, water treatment and solid

waste systems, public buildings, and other structures and facilities essential for our citizens; and,

WHEREAS, it is in the public interest for the citizens, civic leaders, and children in the City of Wilsonville to gain knowledge

of and maintain an ongoing interest and understanding of the importance of public works and public works programs in

their respective communities; and,

WHEREAS, the year 2026 marks the 66th annual National Public Works Week sponsored by the American Public Works

Association, be it now,

WHEREAS, this year’s theme is “Rooted in Service, Powered by Community”.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Shawn O’Neil, Mayor of the City of Wilsonville, in the State of Oregon do hereby designate the week

May 17–23, 2026 to be National Public Works Week

in the City of Wilsonville and urge all community members to pay tribute to our public works professionals and recognize the substantial contributions they make to protecting our health, safety, and advancing quality of life.

Our Public Works employees maintain streets and signs, repair water lines, clean stormwater systems, monitor underground infrastructure, maintain fire hydrants, and perform countless other essential tasks that often go unnoticed. I see them everyday, at all hours helping maintain our community infrastructure and spaces.

Much of this work occurs during severe weather, late at night, along busy roadways, and in hazardous conditions.

Their work keeps our community functioning safely every single day, and I would ask everyone to please join me in thanking and recognizing our outstanding Public Works team.

### **Pride Month Proclamation**

Next is my official proclamation recognizing June as Pride Month in the City of Wilsonville.

Each June, we recognize Pride Month as a time to honor the history, resilience, and contributions of LGBTQ+ people, and to reaffirm our commitment to dignity, equality, inclusion, and belonging for everyone in our community.

As Mayor, I believe it is important that we continue to say clearly and without hesitation that every person in our community deserves dignity, respect, safety, and belonging.

Wilsonville is a stronger community when people are free to live openly, authentically, and without fear of discrimination. Our LGBTQ+ residents, families, neighbors, students, business owners, and community leaders are an important and valued part of this city.

Pride Month is both a celebration and a call for reflection. It celebrates progress toward visibility and equal rights, while reminding us that building welcoming and inclusive communities is ongoing work — work that belongs to all of us.

Pride Month is about more than flags or proclamations. It is about the courage it takes for people to live openly and authentically in a world that does not always make that easy.

As someone with a multiracial family, I personally understand that not all that long ago there were people in this country who believed families like mine should not exist openly either. It was only in 1967, in the Loving v. Virginia decision, that the United States Supreme Court struck down laws banning interracial marriage.

That decision was about more than legal rights. It was about dignity, humanity, and the freedom to love openly, build a family, and live without shame or fear.

Those same principles matter today. Pride Month reminds us that every person deserves the freedom to live authentically and openly, and that no one should ever be made to feel invisible, lesser than, or unwelcome because of who they are or who they love.

For me, belonging is not a slogan. It is the understanding that every person deserves to live safely, honestly, and openly within their own community without fear of discrimination or hatred.

At a time when parts of our national dialogue are becoming more angry, more divided, and more hostile toward vulnerable communities, I believe it is important that cities like Wilsonville speak clearly. We reject hate and dehumanization, and we will continue striving to be a community that chooses compassion, dignity, respect, and humanity.

As Mayor, I want every person in this community to know this: you belong here, you matter here, and this city is stronger because you are part of it.

One way Wilsonville continues putting those values into action is through our annual Pride Celebration.

This year, Wilsonville's Pride Celebration will take place on Saturday, June 13, from 2:00 to 5:00 p.m. at Town Center Park. This free, family-friendly event brings people together in a spirit of community, support, visibility, and joy.

The event will feature emcee Poison Waters, performances by Poison Waters & Friends, music by DJ SMASH, and a featured presentation from Basic Rights Oregon Executive Director Kyndall Mason. There will also be community activities, crafts, food carts, and pride-themed community contests.

I want to thank the City's Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee, community partners, sponsors, volunteers, and staff who continue helping make this event possible.

As we recognize Pride Month, let us continue striving to build a Wilsonville where every person feels safe, valued, respected, and welcomed — not only during Pride Month, but every single day of the year.

I will now read the proclamation:

**WHEREAS, June is the month we celebrate LGBTQIA+ Pride Month, recognizing the significant contributions and struggles of the lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer/ questioning, intersex, asexual individuals as well as other identities not explicitly listed (LGBTQIA+) community; and**

**WHEREAS, the Stonewall Riots in 1969 were a turning point in the LGBTQIA+ rights movement, and Pride Month is a time to remember and honor this historic moment; and**

**WHEREAS, Wilsonville values diversity and embraces the richness that the LGBTQIA+ community brings to our city and this month is a time to reaffirm our commitment to equality and inclusion; and**

**WHEREAS, Wilsonville 's LGBTQIA+ community is a diverse and essential part of our city who contribute to the widespread academic, economic, artistic, political, and social spheres within and around the Wilsonville community; and**

**WHEREAS, Pride Month in Wilsonville is meant to raise awareness of prejudice, discrimination, and lack of understanding still facing**

## **Budget Committee Meetings — May 6 and May 12**

The Wilsonville Budget Committee — which consists of the City Council along with an equal number of community members — met on May 6 and May 12 to review the proposed City budget.

I'm pleased to report that the Budget Committee unanimously approved the budget on May 12. The budget will now move forward to the City Council for final adoption at our June 1 meeting.

I want to thank the City's Finance team, led by Finance Director Keith Katko and Assistant Finance Director Katherine Smith, along with all City staff who helped present information and answer questions throughout the process.

## **Other Meetings and Community Events**

**On May 7**, and again earlier today, I attended the Clackamas County Coordinating Committee and Washington County Coordinating Committee meetings, where regional leaders discuss transportation, housing, economic development, and other issues impacting our communities.

**On May 11**, was the Washington County Budget Information Session where the County Administrator provided an overview of the County's current financial outlook.

**On May 13**, I had the opportunity to visit Ms. Carolina Wilde's 8th Grade Language Arts classes at Inza Wood Middle School. Students gave thoughtful presentations advocating for ideas and improvements they would like to see in Wilsonville.

Honestly, listening to the next generation of leaders in our community is one of the best parts of serving as Mayor.

**On May 15**, I was honored to provide opening remarks at the Oregon State Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution conference, which was held here in Wilsonville at the Holiday Inn.

With our nation approaching the 250th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence, it was a particularly meaningful event and an important opportunity to reflect on both our history and the responsibilities we share moving forward.

May is also Bike Month and Walk + Roll Challenge Month.

SMART is hosting group rides, challenges, prize drawings, and other community activities throughout the month to encourage people of all ages to stay active, explore Wilsonville, and connect with one another through active transportation.

Finally, I want to remind the community that City offices and the Wilsonville Public Library will be closed on Monday, May 25, in observance of Memorial Day. SMART transit service will also not operate that day.

The City will hold a Memorial Day Remembrance Ceremony at 10:00 AM at the Oregon Korean War Memorial in Town Center Park. All members of the public are welcome to attend this important event honoring those who gave their lives in service to our country.
