


City of Wilsonville Emergency Operations Plan Plan (EOP) Update

What is the EOP?

The City of Wilsonville Emergency Operations Plan serves as the foundational plan for the City's emergency management program.

It provides a multi-hazard approach to how the City will conduct emergency operations.

What is New in the 2025 Update?

- Full Plan Refresh – Reflects current City organization, authorities, capabilities, and partnerships.
- Community Lifelines Integration – Framework for identifying what must be protected during emergencies.
- Enhanced EOC Concept & ICS Support – Updated approach for EOC operations and stronger ICS implementation guidance.
- Refreshed Annexes – Includes a new Extreme Heat Annex and updates to functional and incident annexes.

Process and Engagement

The Emergency Operations Plan was developed over nine months with a deliberate focus on engaging City departments and external partners throughout the process.

The EOP is organized in three primary parts:

- Incident Annexes

Each module consists of the following elements:



Scenario Update that presents the expanding scenario



Situation Status Update organized using Community Lifelines



Player Discussion using simulated activities and discussion questions

Exercise Key Takeaways

Strengthen Operational Capability

- Test dual-location operations (City EOC + ICP at Public Works).
- Move from discussion-based to operational exercises.
- Annual setup drills; progress to functional exercises.
- Include: Ability to support 24-hour operations with integrated shift change component.

Advance Planning Cycle & Tools

- Focus: Understand the planning cycle and integrate Community Lifelines.
- Develop tailored templates for SitReps, agendas, and IAPs aligned with ICS and city structure.

Deepen External Partnerships

- Focus: Create space for support departments to practice their roles.
- Expand collaboration with agencies for critical services (e.g., Red Cross, Clackamas County).
- Enhance capabilities of supporting departments.
