<p><a href="#"><u>GRC 8.25.015</u></a></p> <p>(1) Notwithstanding GRC 8.25.010(3)(a), a person may park a recreational vehicle for a period not to exceed 72 hours if a no-cost permit is issued pursuant to this section.</p> <p>(2) Applications for a permit shall be made on forms or in a manner prescribed by the manager. The application shall include acknowledgement that the applicant will comply with the provisions of this section.</p> <p>(3) A permit shall only allow parking of a recreational vehicle immediately adjacent to a property on a site occupied with a single detached dwelling unit or middle housing unit. 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<p><u><a href="#">MMC 10.28.205</a></u></p> <p>Upon application <b>and payment of the established permit fee</b>, the chief of police or their designee will issue a parking permit allowing for a recreational vehicle to be parked on any public highway, road, street, or right-of-way within the city, if the following conditions are met:</p> <p>A. The permit will be valid for not more than 72 consecutive hours;</p> <p>B. The permit must be displayed on a recreational vehicle that is parked within 200 feet of residential real property owned or leased by the permit applicant;</p> <p>C. A single recreational vehicle may not be issued more than four parking permits during a calendar year, regardless of location parked;</p> <p>D. The starting time for recreational vehicle parking permit may not be less than 72 hours after the expiration time of a previous permit issued for the same recreational vehicle;</p> <p>E. Except for loading and unloading and other related purposes that does not exceed 12 hours, a person may park a recreational vehicle for a period not to exceed 72 hours if a no-cost permit is issued pursuant to this section.</p> <p>B. A permit may be renewed two additional times for a total of three consecutive 72-hour periods. However, no more than six recreational vehicle parking permits will be issued per calendar year for a residential dwelling.</p> <p>C. Applications for a permit shall be made on forms or in a manner prescribed by the City Manager.</p> <p>D. A permit shall only allow parking of a recreational vehicle immediately adjacent to a property with an occupied residential dwelling. Only the owner or lawful tenant of the dwelling will be issued a permit.</p> <p>E.
