RE:	Community Outreach Plan – RVs and Abandoned Vehicles

As part of its 2025-27 Council Goals, the City Council adopted Goal 2: Public Safety. The first outcome identified in Goal 2 is to "streamline response to code enforcement challenges." To achieve this outcome, Strategy 2.1 calls for the City to "investigate enforcement solutions for RVs (and examine abandoned vehicle definition in code)." To help guide this Strategy, two questions arise: (1) what is the issue Council seeks to address; and (2) how does Council address the identified issue?

This Community Outreach Plan Memorandum (the "Outreach Plan") discusses how City staff intend to engage with the community to aid the Council in formulating answers to the above two questions. This Outreach Plan for the City's vehicle code revision project consists of four (4) different components of outreach, namely: (1) educational information; (2) a community questionnaire through *Let's Talk, Wilsonville*!; and (3) stakeholder interviews.

A. Educational Information

Staff plan to develop a project page on *Let's Talk, Wilsonville!* that will start with a "Did You Know/Q&A" page or click-through infographic for community members. Staff seek to provide information about current, applicable City and State regulations and to provide data, like the data provided to Council in the July 21, 2025 Council Work Session, so that community members have a better understanding of the current landscape. For example, information staff intend to provide include:

- Street parking time limitations under City Code
- What is considered an "abandoned vehicle" under City Code
- Circumstances when a vehicle may be immediately towed
- How much the City pays, on average, to tow an RV
- How many calls the Police Department receives per month regarding street parking and abandoned vehicles or RVs
- The distinctions between regulating public parking areas and private parking areas

B. Community Questionnaire

Staff took examples from previous outreach efforts for similar programs regarding livability in Wilsonville to develop draft questions for a community questionnaire through *Let's Talk, Wilsonville!* Draft questions, subject to further refinement, are provided below. For the section on proposed changes, staff included, for Council's information, the pros and cons of the particular proposals.

a. Current Regulation:

<u>Parking</u>: Except as further limited by Wilsonville's current camping regulations, no vehicle shall be parked on any street for more than 72 hours without moving at least three vehicle lengths away. (WC 5.200)

<u>Abandoned Vehicles</u>: A vehicle left unoccupied or unclaimed or in a damaged or dismantled condition such that the vehicle is inoperable. (WC 5.035.(1)) <u>Towing:</u> If an authorized officer has probable cause to believe that a vehicle is stored or abandoned for a period over 72 hours upon any City property, notice shall be provided and if requested, a hearing in which the tow is validated, the authorized officer may tow and impound. Towing without prior notice is permitted when the vehicle constitutes a hazard, causes a disturbance to the peace, is illegally parked etc. (WC 5.400).

- i. <u>Pros</u>: 72 hours allows for community members and residents to park and move vehicles in a reasonable amount of time, and is consistent with other communities' regulations. Outside of two neighborhoods, Wilsonville community members do not require a permit to park their vehicles outside their homes or on City streets. Currently, enforcement is mostly complaint-driven, and code enforcement/police respond to issues and violations within a timely manner.
- ii. <u>Cons</u>: Wilsonville's code lacks a detailed abandoned vehicle definition, updating which could aid enforcement efforts in removing abandoned vehicles in a timely manner.
- b. **Updated 72-Hour Regulation:** Retain time limitation of 72 hours, but amend WC 5.200 to require that vehicles parked for a 72-hour period must not return to the same location for a minimum of 24 hours.
 - i. <u>Pros</u>: 72 hours allows for community members and residents to park and move vehicles in a reasonable amount of time. With the additional regulation, can ensure that the same vehicle is continuously occupying the same space on City streets with minimal time away.
 - ii. <u>**Cons</u>**: Tracking both the 72 hours of parking and the 24 hours away adds administrative burden and may be more challenging to enforce.</u>
- c. Updated Abandoned Vehicle Definition: Revise the definition of "abandoned vehicle" in Wilsonville Code to apply to vehicles that meet one or more of the following conditions: (1) expired vehicle registration for an extended period of time (Clackamas County regulation is 90 days); (2) appears to be inoperative or disabled; or (3) appears to be wrecked, partially dismantled, or junked.
 - i. **Pros**: Incorporating language that allows any one of these conditions to trigger the notice and removal process provides law enforcement with more actionable criteria, streamlining response times and ensuring more consistent application of the code.
 - ii. <u>**Cons</u>**: Some subjectivity for law enforcement to determine whether a vehicle appears to be inoperative, disabled, wrecked, or junked.</u>
- d. **Zone Updating/Differentiation:** City will designate specific parking regulations per zone (i.e. Residential, Commercial, Industrial). Specific regulations may include variations of permittable parking hours, length of time away before a vehicle may return, etc.

- i. <u>Pros</u>: If the community's main concern is vehicles overstaying reasonable hours in their neighborhood or experiencing a lack of available parking for residents, implementing tailored regulations per zone may be helpful. Additionally, business owners and industrial areas may have different priorities for regulation, avoiding any disproportionate impacts from sweeping changes in policy.
- ii. <u>Cons</u>: Creating the various zones will require an initial administrative burden and expense of resources. Planning, production and placement of regulation signs across the area, including maintenance costs over time. Enforcement capabilities may be limited.
- e. **RV Permit Program:** RV users can obtain a free permit for 72 hour street parking subject to renewal limitations (no more than 6 passes annually) and unloading/loading exceptions for up to 12 hours? Violators will be notified, cited, or towed depending on repeat infractions, time between notice and removal, etc.
 - Pros: This permit program will provide a time limit on RV's parked on public streets. The permits will be free to obtain and accessible to RV owners online. Exceptions for brief loading/unloading periods will not require a permit. A permit program provides a registration and tracking process for code enforcement to ensure compliance.
 - ii. <u>Cons</u>: Although a few other jurisdictions similar to Wilsonville have adopted similar programs, there is an inconsistent range of efficacy. Results have been mixed, depending on several other limiting factors such as administrative burden, towing costs to the city, and availability of code enforcement resources. Without known outcomes, this program may be an over-regulation, causing inconvenience and unnecessary burden on RV owners without effectively solving the central issue.

C. Stakeholder Outreach

The staff team has developed a list of stakeholders, based on research efforts on who may be most impacted by code updates/programs. The list is divided into five (5) categories: (1) City advisory committees and other public agencies such as TVF&R, Police, Code Compliance, Library Board, and the Parks and Recreation Board; (2) Wilsonville businesses, particularly those with larger parking lots (Safeway/Fred Meyer/Costco); (3) RV owners; (4) People living in RVs; and (5) HOAs.

Staff plans to conduct interviews with the stakeholder groups. The above knowledge check and questionnaire will be provided to Wilsonville community members.
