One component of the SMART yard expansion is the preparation for future electric vehicle charging. Conduits have been installed and stubbed out to eliminate the need for any further construction work when additional chargers are needed in the future. Three chargers are being installed as part of the current project, which meets demand at this time. As more electric buses are added, we will have an additional of six charger locations available for use.

Over the last six months, we have been working with consultants to study our longer transit routes and consider options to serve them with battery electric buses. In June, SMART staff met with staff from Cherriots, the transit provider for Salem, to discuss their experience with different battery electric charging types and talk about possible future collaboration between the two agencies for charging infrastructure on our shared routes. We are not planning any shared charging in the short term, but we will share information and keep talking as new charging technology emerges. As part of this work, staff have also looked more closely at our PGE energy use and changed rate schedules for bus charging that will save money for the City. This study has given us important information as we consider buying the next round of battery electric buses in the next few years.

The month-long online challenge was open to anyone living or working in the Metro region.
