# **Director's Report**

April brought some terrific weather which allowed community members to get out and enjoy our parks and outdoor spaces in a variety of ways. The nice weather allowed us to open up our athletic fields to our local sports teams. April also marks the opening of our reservation season, allowing us to open up our shelters and the Stein-Boozier Barn for seasonal use.

One of our largest community events, the community egg hunt was held on April 19 on the Memorial Park athletic fields, where a large crowd gathered to hunt for over 18,000 eggs filled with prizes, candy, and even prize tickets that led to larger prizes such as Easter baskets, stuffed animals, and gift certificates for savings on park and recreation programs.

Also, in April was a multicultural dance festival and the heARTS of Wilsonville, Many Cultures, One Heart public art reception. Both of these events were put on by the Arts, Culture, and Heritage Commission. The hearts are now on display all over town and will be out for the next six months to a year.

### Multicultural Dance Night—April 3

The Arts, Culture, and Heritage Commission (ACHC) presented Wilsonville's first Multicultural Dance Celebration Event on April 3 at the McMenamin's Old Church. Staff booked three performance groups including: Eien Hunter Ishikawa performing traditional Japanese Dances, Jayanthi Raman Dance Company performing Classical Indian Dances, and Huitzilopochtli Danza Azteca performing indigenous dances from Mexico. Each performance also included the groups speaking about the culture and meaning behind the dances. Attendees enjoyed an evening celebrating the rich cultures of Wilsonville through vibrant multicultural dance performances.

### heARTs of Wilsonville: Many Cultures, One Heart Opening Reception April 30

The City's newest Public Art Project was on display for the opening reception of heARTs of Wilsonville: Many Cultures, One Heart on April 30 at the Stein-Boozier Barn. This special evening provided a sneak-peak opportunity to view all 10 hearts on display.

The project started back in September 2024 when the Call for Art Application solicited unique designs from artists for this project which consists of large fiberglass hearts measuring about 4.5 ft tall



by 4.5 ft tall! The project theme "Many Cultures, One Heart" aims to represent the distinctive artistic, cultural, and historical framework that makes Wilsonville a wonderful place. Artwork designs were encouraged to incorporate the diversity of the city to celebrate the many communities located here. 29 designs were received which the Arts, Culture, and Heritage Commission scored and reviewed, and ultimately made the selections on which 10 artists should be awarded a heart. The artists took 2— 3 months completing their work before turning the hearts back into the City. The Parks Maintenance team were integral in building the base boxes for the hearts and loading and unloading them to assist the artists. They also managed the installation which took place the very morning after the reception. The response from both City Staff and the Community has been extremely positive, and people are grateful for more colorful artwork in Wilsonville and to hunt for all 10 hearts!

Online you can find more information about the artists, their designs, as well as find a map that shows where all 10 hearts are installed around town. This project was funded by Wilsonville—Metro Community Enhancement funds.

### Arts, Culture, and Heritage Commission (ACHC)

April was a busy month for the ACHC with the Multicultural Dance Event and the heARTs of Wilsonville: Many Cultures, One Heart Project! In Addition to these huge milestones, at their April meeting they also awarded the June Temporary Pride Month Mural to artist Daren Todd after reviewing two design options. They also reviewed request for qualifications (RFQ) submissions by the top 10 finalists for the Boones Ferry Park Public Art Project which will be a large sculptural art work. At this meeting the ACHC determined the three artists to advance in this project who will receive a stipend to create a unique design proposal. The ACHC will then award the project to one artist/team at a future meeting.

### **Kitakata Sister City Advisory Board (KSCAB)**

The Kitakata Sister City Advisory Board met in April to recap their March meeting with Kitakata. The board brainstormed ideas for the December student delegation, as well as planned out meetings for the next few months, as the staff liaison will be out on maternity leave.

The Parks and Recreation Advisory Board met in April to award funds for the Community Opportunity Grant.
