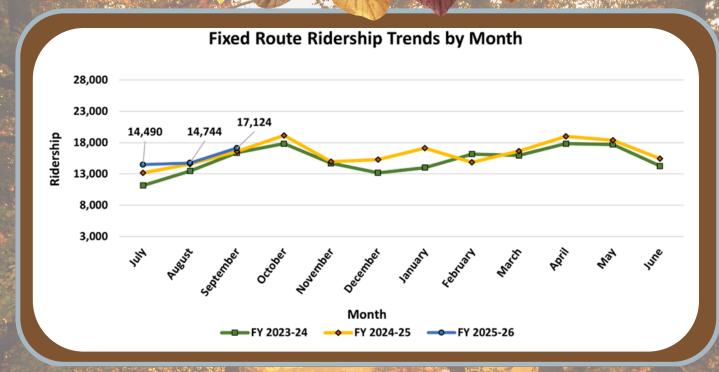

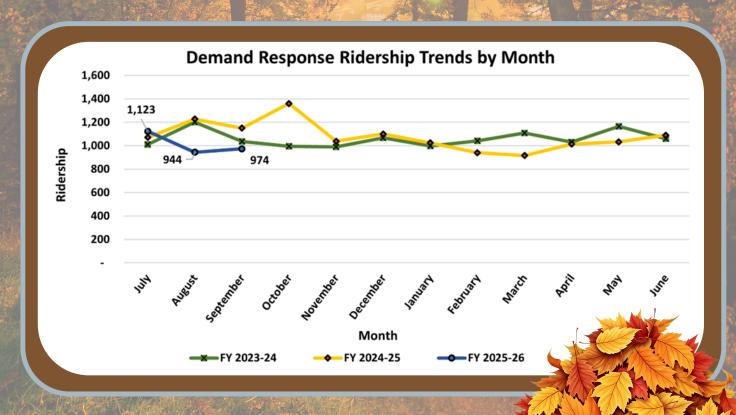

As we approach the holiday season, SMART reaffirms its commitment to providing Wilsonville residents with reliable connections — to resources, to jobs, to local activities, and to time with family and friends. In October, SMART provided over 11,000 trips connecting Wilsonville residents to local businesses and community resources. In addition, our Dial-a-Ride service supported our community's most vulnerable members with 962 trips, offering vital connections to medical, recreational, and other essential destinations.

To ensure SMART's continued ability to serve the community now and in the future, we have welcomed five new drivers to our team. Looking ahead, a new five-person driver training class will begin on November 3, 2026. These dedicated professionals will help SMART meet both current and future operational needs.

Oregon's Get There Challenge returned October 1-14, encouraging Oregonians to log trips and remote work in the Get There Connect tool for a chance to win prizes and gain recognition.

Participants could log bus, train, carpool, vanpool, bike, walk, and/or remote work trips. New this year, participants had to be part of a network—with each trip contributing not only to individual progress but also to their network's overall performance in the challenge.

If you live in Wilsonville, you were invited to join the Wilsonville SMART Network. If you work in Wilsonville, you could join the SMART Employer Network and represent your workplace in the competition.

Alongside the statewide challenge, SMART kept the excitement going with a local competition of our own! Anyone who logged trips between October 1–14 was automatically entered into a drawing for a \$50 e-gift card, with the winner announced on October 20. The more trips participants logged, the greater their chances were to win! The SMART Challenge had 41 participants with 682 trips logged!

SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL

October helped Safe Routes to School programming roll smoothly into fall. SMART staff partnered with Reborn Bikes to support Lowrie Primary's annual Wheel-a-thon. This year's event took on a more educational focus as SMART hosted Bike Rodeo activities, helping students build confidence with balancing, stopping, turning, and following the rules of the road. Reborn Bikes also provided bikes and helmets to students in need, creating more riders for years to come.

SMART staff highlighted and celebrated International Walk + Roll to School Day on Wednesday, October 8. In the days leading up to the event, SMART's Safe Routes programming distributed snacks and prizes to students who walked to Boones Ferry Primary and Wood Middle School. On the day of the celebration, SMART led a Walking School Bus along Wilsonville Road for students at Meridian Creek Middle School.





October also marked the launch of Wilsonville's first Bike Bus for students at Lowrie Primary. A Bike Bus is a variation of the walking school bus which provides students the opportunity to bike to and from school with adult supervision. With the help of parent volunteers, SMART staff led a small group of students from the Villebois Skate Park to school, picking up more riders along the way.
