June was another strong month for the Wolfforth Public Library as Summer Reading continued to bring families, children, teens, and adults into the library. Our calendar featured a variety of engaging programs, including partnerships with Texas Tech K-12 Global Outreach, the Texas Tech Museum, and a special performance by Mr. Blue Shoes. During June, we also refreshed one of our existing early childhood programs by introducing Little

Explorers, replacing our previous format with a more interactive experience focused on hands-on learning, play, and early literacy development for our youngest patrons. In addition, the Sustainable Food Center returned to the library with its Happy Kitchen program, providing participants with healthy cooking instruction and a bag of groceries to prepare a nutritious meal at home. These partnerships and program enhancements continue to expand educational opportunities for our community while making the most of existing library resources.

Beyond programming, staff have been making significant progress on a comprehensive collection development initiative to ensure the library's materials remain current, relevant, and responsive to community needs. This ongoing project includes evaluating collections, updating classifications where appropriate, and refining the overall organization of materials to improve discoverability for patrons. Combined with consistently strong circulation, visitor numbers, and program participation, these efforts show that the library continues to grow while maintaining the high level of service our community has come to expect.
